AN ORDINANCE

No. 2 of 1910.

Title. **An Ordinance to amend the laws relating to the Taxation of Natives.**

Date. [11th March, 1910.]

BE it enacted by the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof:—

Short Title.
Commencement
Definition

1. This Ordinance may be cited as “The Native Hut and Poll Tax Ordinance 1910” and shall have effect as from the first day of April 1910.

2. In this Ordinance unless inconsistent with the context.

The term “Native” means any native of Africa not being of European or Asiatic race or origin, and includes any Swahili or Somali.

The term “Adult Native” means a Native who is or appears to be of the age of sixteen years or over.

The word “Hut” means any hut or building whatsoever used by a native as a dwelling.

The term “Collector” shall include a District Commissioner or Assistant District Commissioner and any person appointed by the Governor to assist in the collection of taxes leviable under this Ordinance.

The term “Annually” in reference to the period for which the taxes prescribed by this Ordinance are payable, means each period from the 1st April to the 31st March following.

Hut tax

3. There shall be paid annually to a Collector on behalf of the Government of the Protectorate by every Native a tax (hereinafter referred to as the Hut Tax) of three Rupees in respect of every hut owned by him, and, if any such Native has more than one wife living in one hut, he shall pay a further tax of three Rupees in respect of each additional wife living in such hut.

Areas and tribes
to be Pro-
claimed for the
Poll Tax.

4. The Governor may, from time to time as he may think fit by proclamation, order that the tax prescribed by section 5 of this Ordinance shall be levied within such district, area or place (hereinafter referred to as a “Proclaimed Area”) or shall be paid by the members of such tribe (hereinafter referred to as a “Proclaimed Tribe”) as he may by such proclamation direct, and may in like manner withdraw or alter any such order.

Poll Tax.

5. Every adult male Native, being a member of a Proclaimed tribe or residing in a Proclaimed area, who shall not be liable to pay the Hut Tax hereinbefore provided for, shall pay annually to a Collector on behalf of the Government of the Protectorate a tax (hereinafter referred to as the “Poll Tax”) of three Rupees

Taxes to be paid
in coin or notes,
current in the
Protectorate
except when the
Governor may
otherwise direct.

6. (1) The said taxes shall be payable in coin or notes current in the Protectorate.

Provided that in cases of necessity the Governor may authorise the payment of the taxes in any area or areas in any marketable stock or produce, the cost of the conversion of such stock or produce into money being in all cases charged against the person tendering the same;

- (2) A receipt for the amount of each tax paid by each native shall be delivered by the Collector to the person or persons paying the same.

7. The amount due from each native for Hut Tax or Poll Tax shall be payable on the first day of April in every year commencing with the first day of April 1910, and shall be recoverable at any time on conviction before a Magistrate by distress and in default of distress the Court may order imprisonment with or without hard labour for any period not exceeding three months, and further without prejudice to that mode of recovery or procedure any hut or huts in respect of which the tax has not been paid or recovered by distress on or before the 31st day of December, in the year next following that in which the tax became due, shall be liable to be forfeited to the Government of the Protectorate.

Taxes when due.
How Recoverable.

8. (1) Anything in the preceding Sections notwithstanding, any native who in the opinion of the Collector has not and cannot procure the means of paying the tax payable by him, may be directed by a District Commissioner to work for the Government in lieu of paying such tax. In such case such native shall work for a period of one month, in respect of every three Rupees due from him, in such place or places within the Province within which he is ordinarily resident, and at such work as may be directed by a Provincial or District Commissioner.
- Labour in lieu of payment of tax

- (2) In every case where a native is directed to work under the provisions of the preceding Sub-section he shall be deemed to be engaged for work for the period directed under a contract duly entered into under and in accordance with the law for the time being in force relating to contracts of service entered into by native Labourers, and such law shall apply to such service and to the native and the person under whom he may be directed to work, save that no wages shall be payable to the native during such period.

9. (1) The Governor may from time to time appoint such persons as he may think fit to assist in the collection of the said taxes, and may make rules, with penalties for the breaches thereof, providing for the collection of the said tax and defining the duties and responsibility of chiefs of tribes and headmen of villages in respect of the payment of the said taxes by members of such tribes or by Natives residing in such villages.
- Appointment of persons to assist in collection of taxes.
Powers to make rules providing for the collection of taxes and defining duties of chiefs of tribes and headmen under this Ordinance.

- (2) The Governor may make such arrangement for the payment of the persons appointed by him, under the preceding sub-section, whether by salary or commission, as shall appear to him necessary or expedient.
- And to make arrangement for payment of persons appointed to assist in collection.

10. Whenever it shall be proved to the satisfaction of a Collector that any person liable to pay any tax leviable under this Ordinance is without sufficient means to pay the whole amount of such tax and is unable to obtain employment by reason of age or infirmity, such Collector may, subject as hereinafter provided, allow the remission of the whole or a portion of such tax, as the case may require, provided that in such case the Collector shall give to such person a certificate in such form as may be prescribed, which certificate shall relieve the person in respect of whom the same shall have been given from liability to pay any tax leviable under this Ordinance for the period mentioned in such certificate, unless the same shall be cancelled under the direction of a District Commissioner or Assistant District Commissioner, which cancellation such officers are hereby authorised and required to direct whenever it shall appear that any certificate has been granted without good and sufficient reason.

Power to remit tax in certain cases.

11. The Governor may make arrangements with any tribe or village for the commutation of the hut tax by payment of a lump sum per annum, to be taken either in money, kind or labour.

Governor may make arrangements for commutation of tax.

Power to
Governor to
grant exemption
from tax.

12. The Governor may by writing under his hand order that any person or class of persons or the members of any tribe or the inhabitants of any district, area or place shall be exempt from payment of the whole or any portion of any tax leviable under this Ordinance, and may in like manner rescind or alter any such order.

Power to pre-
scribe forms and
make rules.

13. The Governor may from time to time make, alter, vary or revoke rules prescribing the form of any receipt or certificate to be given under this Ordinance, and generally for the better carrying out and giving effect to the provisions of this Ordinance.

Collector may
enter land and
buildings in
execution of duty.

14. A Collector may enter upon any land or into any building in the execution of his duties under this Ordinance.

Repeal.

15. The East Africa Hut Tax Ordinance 1903 is hereby repealed. Provided, however, that any tax due and unpaid at the date of the commencement of this Ordinance may be recovered in the manner prescribed by section 7 of this Ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE

No. 3 of 1910.

An Ordinance to make provision for the Appointment of Justices of the Peace, and to define the powers and duties of the same.

[11th March, 1910.]

BE it enacted by the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Justices of the Peace Ordinance 1910."

The Governor
may appoint
Justices of the
Peace.

2. It shall be lawful for the Governor to appoint under his hand and the Public Seal of the Protectorate as occasion may require, any resident of the Protectorate being a British Subject of European Extraction to be a Justice of the Peace for the Protectorate or for any District thereof, who shall hold office during the Governor's pleasure, and whose appointment shall be notified in the "Official Gazette."

Oath to be taken
by a Justice.

Every Justice of the Peace shall on appointment take and subscribe the oaths in the forms in the Schedule annexed hereto before a Judge of the High Court or a Magistrate of the First Class in open Court.

Powers of
Justice.

3. A Justice of the Peace shall, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance have and exercise within the limits for which he is appointed such powers, rights, duties and jurisdictions as are vested in a Justice of the Peace by this Ordinance or by or in virtue of any Ordinance for the time being in force in the Protectorate.

May administer
oaths.

4. Every Justice of the Peace shall be authorised and is hereby required to administer oaths and take solemn declarations in matters where statements upon oath or solemn declarations are required by law or when otherwise requested so to do. Provided, however, whenever in accordance with any Ordinance or other law rule or order for the time being in force in the Protectorate any fee would be payable if the oath were administered or the solemn declaration taken by a Judge or Magistrate, the Justice of the Peace shall, before administering the oath or taking the declaration require the intending deponent to pay a fee of the same amount as would be required by a Judge or Magistrate, and such fee shall be held by the Justice of the Peace for and on behalf of the Government of the Protectorate and shall be accounted for and paid into the revenues of the Protectorate as hereinafter provided.

5. (1) When an offence, cognizable to the police, is committed in the presence of a Justice of the Peace within the local limits of his jurisdiction, he may himself arrest or order any person to arrest the offender; Provided, however, that such Justice of the Peace shall without unnecessary delay take such offender or cause him to be taken before the nearest Magistrate within whose local jurisdiction such offence shall have been committed. May arrest person committing cognizable offence in his presence.
- (2) Any Justice of the Peace may at any time arrest or direct the arrest, in his presence, within the local limits of his jurisdiction of any person for whose arrest he is competent at the time and in the circumstances to issue a warrant, and shall without unnecessary delay take such person or cause him to be taken before the nearest Magistrate within whose local jurisdiction such person shall have been arrested. May arrest person for whose arrest he could issue a warrant.
- (3) Whenever a Justice of the Peace shall arrest or cause any person to be arrested under the provisions of the preceding sub-sections and shall not himself take the person arrested before the Magistrate, he shall issue a warrant under his hand in the form in the Schedule annexed hereto, and such warrant shall be sufficient authority to the person to whom it shall be directed to take the person arrested before the Magistrate; and, if the person shall have been arrested for an offence committed in the presence of the Justice of the Peace, such Justice of the Peace shall, without unnecessary delay, send to the Magistrate a statement setting forth the facts relating to the offence and the names and addresses of any persons known to him to have been witnesses to the commission of the offence. Warrant to be issued and statement to be forwarded by the Justice when he does not himself take the person arrested before the Magistrate.
6. (1) A Justice of the Peace may : May take cognizance of an offence on complaint or police report.
- (i) upon receiving a complaint of facts which constitute an offence, or
- (ii) upon receiving a police report of such facts, issue process for the purpose of compelling the appearance of the person accused. Provided, however, that such process shall be made returnable before a Magistrate having jurisdiction to try the accused or to commit him for trial. Any process for compelling attendance to be returnable before a Magistrate having jurisdiction to try or commit the accused for trial.
- (2) A Justice of the Peace shall not take cognizance of an offence unless he is satisfied that there is sufficient ground for proceeding, neither shall he issue a warrant unless the case is one in which under the law of Criminal Procedure for the time being in force in the Protectorate, a warrant should issue in the first instance or he sees reason to believe that the person accused has absconded or will not obey a summons. Justice must be satisfied that there are sufficient grounds for proceeding.
- (3) Whenever by the law for the time being in force any Court is prohibited from taking cognizance of any case except with the sanction or on the complaint of the Governor or a Court or a public servant or any person, a Justice of the Peace shall not take cognizance of such case except with the sanction or on the complaint required by such law. When special sanction or complaint required by law Justice not to take cognizance of case without such sanction or complaint.
- (4) If any fee would under the law for the time being in force have been payable if the process had been issued by a Magistrate such fee shall be paid by the person or persons liable to pay the same at the Court of the Magistrate before whom the process is returnable. Process and other fees to be paid to the Magistrate trying the case.
7. A Justice of the Peace taking cognizance of an offence on complaint, shall at once examine the complainant upon oath, and the substance of the examination shall be reduced to writing and be signed by the complainant, and also by the Justice of the Peace. Provided that when a complaint is made in writing, nothing herein contained shall be deemed to require a Justice of the Peace to examine the complainant before issuing process for the purpose of compelling the attendance of the accused before a Magistrate as hereinbefore provided, if such Justice of the Peace is satisfied that the complaint shows sufficient grounds for proceeding. Examination of Complainant by Justice. Not necessary when prima facie case disclosed by written complaint.

When process issued examination, complaint or police report to be forwarded to the Magistrate.

8. (1) Whenever a Justice of the Peace shall issue process as before provided he shall forthwith forward to the Magistrate before whom such process is returnable, the substance of the examination (if any) taken and signed as provided in the preceding section or, if there be no such examination, the written complaint or police report on which such process shall have been issued.

When complaint dismissed complaint, etc., to be forwarded to the High Court.

- (2) Whenever a Justice of the Peace shall dismiss a complaint he shall forthwith forward to the High Court the written complaint (if any) and the substance of the examination taken and signed as before provided together with a statement of his reasons for dismissing the complaint.

Jurisdiction of Magistrate before whom an accused person is brought by or on a process issued by a Justice.

9. A Magistrate before whom any accused person is brought in pursuance of Section 5 of this Ordinance or before whom any process, issued by a Justice of the Peace, shall have been made returnable, shall have the like jurisdiction in the case as if the person had come before him on a process issued by himself or as if the process issued had been issued by himself.

Provided as follows :—

- (i) if the person is brought or the process is made returnable before a Magistrate who is not empowered to try the accused or to commit him for trial, such Magistrate shall forthwith issue process returnable before a Magistrate duly empowered to try or commit the accused for trial.
- (ii) when by any law for the time being in force any process fee or other fees are payable, he shall not proceed with the trial of the case until the fees are paid, and if such fees are not paid within a reasonable time, the Magistrate may dismiss the complaint.

Power of High Court to order further enquiry.

10. (1) Any Judge of the High Court on examining any record required by Section 8 sub-section (2) to be forwarded to the High Court may direct any Subordinate Court to make, and such Court shall then make further enquiry into any complaint which has been dismissed by a Justice of the Peace.

Right of person aggrieved to appeal against order dismissing complaint.

- (2) Any person aggrieved by an order made by a Justice of the Peace dismissing a complaint may appeal to the High Court against such order.

Power of High Court to issue Instructions and Rules of Court.

11. The High Court may from time to time issue instructions and rules of Court not being inconsistent with this or any other Ordinance, as to it may seem proper, for the guidance and control of Justices of the Peace in the exercise and performance of their powers and duties as such, and every Justice of the Peace is hereby required to comply with and obey such instructions and rules.

Justices to keep account of and pay to Treasurer all fees, etc., received.

12. Every Justice of the Peace shall keep in such form as may from time to time be required by the Governor, true and faithful account of all fees and monies paid to him under the provisions of this Ordinance or of any other Ordinance or law for the time being in force authorising or requiring him to receive any fee or monies for or on behalf of His Majesty or of the Government of the Protectorate, and shall produce all such accounts whenever so required by the Government Auditor or other Officer authorised by the Governor on that behalf, and shall render such returns and pay over to the Protectorate Treasurer all fees and monies as aforesaid in such manner and at such times and through such Officers as the Governor shall from time to time direct.

This Ordinance not to apply to Justices appointed by or under the Indian Criminal Procedure Code.

13. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be deemed to affect the power, authority or duty of a Justice of the Peace appointed by or under the provisions of the Indian Criminal Procedure Code, or to confer or impose upon any such Justice of the Peace any power, authority or duty which except for the provisions of this Ordinance he would not be empowered or required to exercise or perform.

Schedule.**Form of oath of Allegiance**

And the fees and monies which I may from time to time receive for and on behalf of His Majesty or the Government of the Protectorate, I will cause to be entered without any concealment or misappropriation, and will truly send them to the Treasurer of the Protectorate or otherwise dispose of them according to law. And I will not obstruct the cause of justice for gift or other cause, but well and truly will discharge my duty as Justice of the Peace without partiality, favour or affection.

PROCLAMATION.**Under The East Africa Townships Ordinance, 1903.**

In exercise of the powers conferred upon me by the East Africa Townships Ordinance, 1903, I hereby give notice that the Rules and Fees as applied to the Townships of Kisii, Kapsabet, Kaptumo and Mumias as notified in the Official Gazette of November 1st, 1909, (page 465 and 466), are hereby applied to the Township of Kericho.

2. That part of the Proclamation dated 10th March, 1906, and published in the "Official Gazette" defining the limits of the Kericho Township area, is hereby cancelled, and in place thereof the boundaries are hereby declared to be those defined for Kericho Government Station and described in the Official Gazette of January 15th, 1910, (page 23).

3. Any rules notified in the Official Gazette and dated 10th March, 1906, shall be where necessary in addition to the rules, now applied.

Governor of the East Africa Protectorate, do hereby declare that the area mentioned in the Schedule hereto attached, and which is located in the Nyanza Province, is excluded from the provisions of the above noted Ordinance.

Rungwe River Trading site on the Homa Bay-Kisii Road.

Commencing at a cairn No. 1 on the North bank of the Rungwe River immediately East of the bridge following down the river for 100 feet to a cairn No. 2; thence in a northerly direction for 650 feet to cairn No. 3; thence in an Easterly direction for 320 feet to cairn No. 4; thence in a Northerly direction for 270 feet to cairn No. 5; thence continuing in a Northerly direction for 525 feet to cairn No. 6; thence in a Westerly direction for $414\frac{3}{4}$ feet about to cairn No. 7; situate on the east side of the Homa Bay-Kisii Road; thence for 725 feet South along the Eastern side of the main road towards the river to cairn No. 8. Thence in a Westerly direction across the main road for 200 feet to cairn No. 9. Thence in an Easterly direction for 200 feet to cairn No. 11; thence in a direct line for 200 feet to cairn No. 1, the point of commencement.

1. These rules shall apply to the Township of Naivasha and Nakuru.

Public Markets.

2. Public Markets may be established in the Township and shall be open for the sale of goods at such times as the District Commissioner shall appoint.

3. The establishment of a Public Market shall be duly notified in the "Official Gazette."

4. A Public Market shall be registered as such by the District Commissioner.

5. A Public Market shall be under the control of the District Commissioner.

6. A Market Master shall be appointed to take charge of a Public Market.

7. The duties of a Market Master shall be to maintain order in the Market and to see that the rules are observed.

8. Rules Nos. 126-149 of the Rules published in the "Official Gazette" of 19th May, 1904 under the East Africa Townships Ordinance 1903, shall apply to the Township of Naivasha and Nakuru except where they are inconsistent with the above rules.

9. Any cart or other vehicle used in the Township shall be registered.

10. Each cart so registered shall bear a registered number.

11. The District Commissioner may refuse to register any cart or vehicle, which is not in proper order or repair or when the wheels thereof are in bad condition and injurious to the roads.

12. Any vehicle whether drawn by animals, propelled by hand or any other power, shall be in charge of a proper and responsible person.

13. Any vehicle found in charge of ignorant and irresponsible drivers whose driving may cause damage to property, may be prevented from using the public roads.

14. There shall be a fee payable for each vehicle registered

15. Provided that no fee shall be payable in respect of

(a) any vehicle owned or used exclusively by the Government or any Department of Government.

(b) Rickshaws or other carriages used entirely as private conveyances for the person of the owners.

Sale of Cattle and other Live Stock.

16. No public sale of cattle or any live stock shall take place except in the recognized BOMAS or yards provided for that purpose, and in the presence of a Licensed Government Broker.

17. Rules 24-52 inclusive, of the Rules published in "Official Gazette" of 19th May, 1904, under the East Africa Townships Ordinance 1903, shall apply to the Townships of Naivasha and Nakuru.

18. The Rules published in the "Official Gazette" and dated 5th May, 1906, and November 7th, 1907, applied to Naivasha and Nakuru respectively are hereby repealed.
