#### STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

This Bill is necessitated by the instructions of the Secretary of State for the Colonies concerning changes of title in the staff of the Medical Department.

## A Bill

### Intituled

## An Ordinance to Provide for New Designations for Medical Officers.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Medical Officers Short title. (Change of Titles) Ordinance, 1926."

2. Where in any Ordinance, Rule, Order, Notice, Change of title. Contract or other document the designations "Principal Medical Officer," " Chief Sanitation Officer " and " Medical Officer of Health " occur they shall be read and construed as though the designations "Director of Medical and Sanitary "Deputy Director of Sanitary Service" Services," and " Sanitation Officer " had been substituted therefor

## A Bill

## Intituled

## An Ordinance to amend the Game Ordinance, 1921.

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Game (Amendment) Ordinance, 1926," and shall be read as one with the Game Ordinance, 1921, hereinafter called the Principal Ordinance and with all amendments to the Principal Ordinance.

Amendment of Section 12 of the Principal Ordinance. 2. Section 12 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor :---

"12. (1) When any animal mentioned in any of the Schedules hereto is captured or killed in contravention of this Ordinance such animal or the trophies of such 10 animal shall belong to Government.

" (2) When any animal mentioned in any of the Schedules hereto or any part of such animal is found, the trophies of such animal or of such part of the animal shall belong to Government.

"(3) When any animal mentioned in any of the Schedules hereto is killed by any person in self-defence, or by accident, or in error, the trophies of such animal shall belong to Government; unless the person killing such animal is in possession of a licence the conditions 20 of which entitle him to kill that animal.

"(4) Any person not being in possession of the appropriate licence, killing such animal in self-defence, or by accident, or in error, shall report at once to the nearest District Commissioner, Game Warden or Police 25 Officer and shall hand in such of the trophies as may be required by the Governor. Failure to comply with the provisions of this subsection shall be an offence against this Ordinance.

"(5) Any person removing any trophy the property 30 of Government with the intention of depriving Government of the same, shall be guilty of an offence against this Ordinance.

" (6) The Governor may waive the right of Government in respect of any animal or any trophy as he may 35 deem fit.

"(7) The Governor may direct the payment of such compensation as shall cover the cost of transport of any trophy to the nearest Government station in any case as he may deem fit.

" (8) The Governor may by Proclamation published in the Gazette authorise the payment to persons finding ivory of rewards calculated in such manner and subject to such conditions as shall be specified in such Proclamation."

Amendment of Section 33 of the Principal Ordinance. **3.** Section 33 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by inserting after the words "Sections 4 and 24 of this Ordinance", the words "except with the consent in writing of the Game Warden."

#### STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

These amendments to the Detention Camps Ordinance. 1925, have been directed by the Secretary of State.

#### Intituled

## An Ordinance to amend the Detention Camps Ordinance, 1925.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "the Detention Short title. Camps (Amendment) Ordinance, 1926," and shall be read as one with the Detention Camps Ordinance, 1925, hereinafter referred to as the Principal Ordinance.

2. Section 5 of the Principal Ordinance is amended by Amendment of Section 5 of the Principal Ordinance.

the addition of the following provisos :---

" (1) A sentence of detention shall in no case exceed the period of imprisonment to which the prisoner could have been sentenced if the Ordinance had not been passed :

" (2) Where an Ordinance provides for fine only or for fine and imprisonment in default of payment the Court may order that in default of payment a sentence of detention be undergone in lieu of imprisonment."

3. ## THE EAST AFRICA TOWNSHIPS ORDINANCE, 1903.

#### Rules.

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon him by the East Africa Townships Ordinance, 1903, and of all other powers thereunto enabling him. His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to make the following Rules :--

1. These Rules may be cited as "the Nakuru Township (Rickshaws) Rules, 1925," and shall apply to the Township of Nakuru.

2. For the purpose of these Rules the following words and expressions shall have the several meanings hereby assigned to them unless there shall be something in the subject or context repugnant to such construction, that is to say :---

(a) The words "public rickshaw" shall mean any rickshaw plying for hire;

(b) The words "rickshaw boy" shall mean a person in charge of or engaged in hauling or pushing a public rickshaw.

3. (1) Every public rickshaw shall be licensed and shall bear a number plate corresponding to the number of the licence. The owner and every person engaged in hauling or pushing a public rickshaw not complying with the terms of this Rule shall each severally be guilty of an offence.

(2) Licences shall be issued by or under the instructions of the Resident Commissioner who shall have entire discretionary power to direct the withholding or granting of a licence in any case.

(3) The holding of a licence shall not be deemed to entitle a licensee to a renewal of his licence after the expiry of the term for which such licence shall have been granted.

(4) Every licensee shall keep at least two-thirds of his rickshaws for which licences shall have been granted in proper condition and plying for hire.

(5) The fees chargeable for licensing a rickshaw shall be :—  $\cdot$ 

(a) For a public rickshaw plying for hire, each Shs. 5 per year;

(b) For a private rickshaw, each Shs. 2 per year.

(6) The owner of any public rickshaws shall not suffer the place provided by him for the housing of his rickshaws to be used as sleeping quarters for any natives. 4. (1) No person shall haul or push any public rickshaw until he shall have been registered as provided in this Rule.

(2) No person shall be registered as a rickshaw boy unless and until he shall have been certified by a duly qualified medical practitioner as fit for such employment and he has received a certificate to that effect from such medical practitioner.

(3) The Resident Commissioner may register as a rickshaw boy any person to whom a medical certificate in the form prescribed under Schedule II has been issued on payment of a deposit of Shs. 2 for a badge, the number of which shall be endorsed on the aforementioned certificate.

(4) Every registered rickshaw boy while engaged in his employment shall wear the numbered badge obtained from the Resident Commissioner on his left arm in a conspicuous place and in such a position that the number can be readily seen.

(5) Every rickshaw boy shall produce an up-to-date certificate of a duly qualified medical practitioner when required to do so by a police officer or by the Resident Commissioner, or by any person duly authorised by the Resident Commissioner.

(6) Any person to whom a badge has been issued by the Resident Commissioner shall on returning his badge together with his certificate to the Resident Commissioner be entitled to a refund of his deposit. Should such badge be lost such rickshaw boy shall be entitled to another badge on payment of a further deposit of a sum not exceeding Shs. 2.

(7) Any registered rickshaw boy may be struck off the register for misconduct or breach of these Rules and in such case shall return his badge and receive back his deposit.

5. No person shall push or haul any public rickshaw containing any passenger or luggage unless such rickshaw shall be hauled or pushed by at least one other person.

6. The owner of every public rickshaw shall maintain the same in a cleanly and good working condition to the satisfaction of the Resident Commissioner and if he shall fail to do so the Resident Commissioner may suspend his licence in respect of such rickshaw, without process of law, and such suspension shall not be removed till such rickshaw has been restored to a proper condition to the satisfaction of the resident Commissioner and a fee of Shs. 10 has been paid to him for the removal of the suspension.

7. No rickshaw boy shall allow any public rickshaw of which he shall be in charge to stand or remain (except while actually employed), at any place other than a Public Stand set apart for the purpose : and no person shall allow any public rickshaw belonging to him, and no rickshaw boy shall allow any public rickshaw of which he shall be in charge, to stand or remain in a Public Stand at any time except during such hours as may from time to time be appointed under this Rule. 8. Every public rickshaw standing or being on any public stand or in any public street shall be deemed to be plying for hire and the hauler thereof may not refuse to accept any offer of immediate engagement from any person not excluded by the Township Rules, unless actually hired for the whole or portion of the time for which such person seeks to engage him or returning to his quarters : provided that the owner of a public rickshaw may reserve such rickshaw for the use of any specified community, the name whereof shall be painted in letters not less than three inches in height upon the front of the rickshaw.

A person shall not enter a public rickshaw reserved for a community other than his own, and the hauler of a reserved public rickshaw shall not accept an offer for engagement from a person not belonging to the appropriate community.

9. No rickshaw boy shall falsely represent himself to be hired, or, subject to the proviso contained in the foregoing Rule on being thereto required, shall neglect or refuse to carry any lawful number of passengers for any person desiring to engage his rickshaw from and to any point within the township area.

10. A rickshaw boy in charge of any public rickshaw shall wait at any place to which the hirer shall have proceeded in such rickshaw for such period not exceeding two hours as the hirer shall require.

11. No owner of a public rickshaw having made an engagement to take up a fare at a given time shall fail or neglect to do so; he shall, however, be liable to the prescribed penalties only if the hirer when making such engagement shall have provided the said owner with a card or writing containing the hirer's name and address and the place and hour at which such engagement shall commence.

12. Every owner of a public rickshaw shall cause to be displayed and at all times maintain in a conspicuous position in the inside of the rickshaw to the satisfaction of the Resident Commissioner words in clear and legible characters indicating the number of passengers for whom such rickshaw is licensed.

13. A greater number of passengers than two shall not be carried in a public rickshaw.

The owner and every person engaged in hauling or pushing a public rickshaw in which a greater number of passengers than two shall be conveyed, and also every such passenger, shall each be guilty of an offence.

For the purpose of this Rule a child under three years of age in charge of an adult shall not be reckoned as a passenger; and two children between the ages of three and twelve shall be reckoned as one passenger only.

14. Any person calling or sending for any public rickshaw and not further employing the same shall pay the fare due from the stand or place where such vehicle may have been engaged to the place to which such vehicle shall have proceeded.

15. All rickshaw boys shall be decently and properly clothed and shall conduct themselves in a proper civil and decorous manner.

16. All public rickshaws on any stand shall be drawn up in the direction appointed by the Resident Commissioner.

17. If a rickshaw shall be left unattended at any public stand or in any road or public place, the owner thereof shall be guilty of an offence, and if such rickshaw shall have been removed to such place as may be appointed by the Resident Commissioner the owner shall not be entitled to recover the same till he shall have paid to the Resident Commissioner a fee at the rate of Shs. 4 for each twenty-four hours or part thereof during which such rickshaw shall be at such place.

18. The owner of every rickshaw, public or private, shall provide therefor a bell or other instrument effectual for giving audible notice of approach of such rickshaw to the satisfaction of the Resident Commissioner and the passenger or the rickshaw boy for whose use such bell or instrument is provided shall sound such bell or article to give notice of approach when meeting any vehicle, horse or other animal or foot-passenger and when turning.

19. No rickshaw boy shall disobey any reasonable order that may be given him by any member of the Police Force on duty.

20. A rickshaw boy who shall enter a public rickshaw and sit or lie therein or who shall place any article of his attire therein at any time shall be guilty of an offence.

21. The owner of a rickshaw whether public or private shall provide and maintain on such rickshaw two lamps which shall be securely attached to such rickshaw one on each side thereof by metal brackets or otherwise. Every such lamp shall give a light of not less than one candle-power and shall be so placed as to throw a white light in front of the rickshaw and shall have one red glass so placed as to throw a red light behind the rickshaw.

After the hour of 6.15 p.m. and until 6 a.m. railway time, every rickshaw while in use shall have the lamps provided in terms of this Rule lit and the light thereof shall not be masked or obstructed. The owner and every person engaged in hauling or pushing a rickshaw on which at any time between the said hours lamps as above prescribed are not lighted and carried in the manner prescribed shall each severally be guilty of an offence.

22. Any person who shall contravene or fail to comply with any of the provisions of or shall be guilty of an offence against any of these Rules shall be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding Shs. 400 and in default of payment to imprisonment of either kind for a period not exceeding two months.

23. (a) The rates and fares to be charged for public rickshaws plying for hire shall be as set forth in Schedule I hereto.

(b) Any public rickshaw may be hired either by time or by distance, but the hirer of a public rickshaw shall inform the rickshaw boy in charge thereof at the time of hiring if he intends to hire the rickshaw by time.

24. Offences against any of the following Rules, viz., Nos. 4 (1), 5 (2), (4), (5), 7, 9, 10, 11, 12, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20 and 22 shall be cognisable to the police. 25. The Nakuru Township Amendment Rules, 1919, are hereby repealed.

26. The word "rickshaw" is hereby deleted wherever it occurs in Rules issued under the East Africa Townships Ordinance, 1903, and dated 23rd August, 1910, in so far as the said Rules apply to the Township of Nakuru.

(1) The Railway Station.

(2) The Indian Bazaar.

(3) The Resident Commissioner's Office.

(4) Mr. Tod's house on Plot 3, Section XV.

Notes :---

(1) The above fares are for the use of the rickshaw, whether by one passenger or by two.

(2) The special 50 cents fare applies only to journeys inside the area and not to any part of a journey begun or ended outside the area.

(3) No sum shall be charged for the return journey of a rickshaw after dismissal to the place at which it was engaged.

#### EXTRA FARES.

(1) The fare for waiting in the case of a rickshaw hired by distance, if the period of waiting exceeds five minutes in the aggregate, is for each quarter of an hour or part thereof 50 cents.

(2) A passenger may break a journey and detain a rickshaw any number of times on any trip subject to paying an extra fare for waiting at the rate of 50 cents for each quarter of an hour or part thereof.

(3) Between the hours of midnight and 6 a.m. double fares may be charged.

#### KENYA PRESENTATION FOUNDATIONERSHIPS AT CHRIST'S HOSPITAL SCHOOLS.

#### NOTICE.

NOTICE is hereby given that through the good offices of the Secretary of State for the Colonies a Donation Governor of Christ's Hospital has been appointed to represent the Government of Kenya, who is now in a position to present one European boy or girl, on the recommendation of the Governor in Council and subject to the provisions of the Hospital regulations, as a Foundationer for free admission to the schools of Christ's Hospital at Horsham and Hertford respectively.

2. Admissions of children take place at meetings of the Committee of Education, Christ's Hospital, held in January and September each year. One vacancy for Kenya presentation is available now and a further presentation will be available in three years' time, and thereafter as vacancies occur so that there can always be two children on Kenya presentation in residence.

3. It must be understood that Christ's Hospital is a Church of England school and that, whilst there is no objection to the grant of a nomination to a child on the ground that he or she is not of the Church of England, the child would be required to attend prayers and religious services in the School

chapel and the Hospital authorities cannot make arrangements or grant facilities for a boy or girl to attend prayers and religious services in the School chapel during term time.

4. Children are only eligible for presentation between the properly certified ages of 9 and 11 years. Boys will at first enter a preparatory department of the School at West Horsham and be drafted subsequently to the Boys' School there. Girls are sent to the Girls' School at Hertford. It is expected that children who thus enter the Schools will remain at them for about seven years.

5. All children admitted in this way will be subject to the provisions of the scheme. No child can be admitted to the Foundation of the Hospital whose parents or guardians are not in the opinion of the Council of Almoners in need of assistance towards the education and maintenance of their children, and children will receive education, maintenance, and clothing at the cost of the Foundation. If, in the opinion of the Council, the guardians are not able to contribute substantially towards the education and maintenance of the child, these will be given free. If the guardians are so able they will have to pay not less than £10 nor more than £40 a year in aid of the General Fund of the Foundation.

6. Before children are admitted they must be satisfactorily certified to be of good character and sufficient bodily health. If, after admission, they are found to be disqualified, they will immediately be returned to their parents or guardians.

7. Each child must pass an educational examination in the following subjects :---

(1) *Reading*: To read with facility and intelligence from some standard author, reading book or History of England.

(2) Writing: To write legibly and correctly from dictation, with pen and ink on paper, an easy passage of ordinary English.

(3) Arithmetic: To work accurately sums in the four simple and compound rules of arithmetic. In the case of younger children, a thorough grounding in the principles of elementary notation and numeration, with a sound knowledge of the four simple rules, will be accepted as a sufficient test.

(4) Geography: To have a knowledge of elementary geographical terms and of the main features of the map of England.

(5) English Grammar: To be able to distinguish the different parts of speech.

The examination is not restricted to any particular books. No examination papers are published.

## THE DISEASES OF ANIMALS ORDINANCE, 1906.

#### NOTICE.

THE following instructions are issued under Rule 40 of the Diseases of Animals Ordinance, 1918:—

Movement of cattle not branded as immune to East Coast Fever from the districts of North Nyeri (North and West Kenya) and Laikipia to any non-infected East Coast Fever area outside those districts will only be permitted on a permit signed by the District Veterinary Officer.

Such permits will not be issued until the District Veterinary Officer has satisfied himself that the cattle to be moved have been dipped in an efficient dipping fluid for a period of eight weeks as laid down by regulation.

Application for movement should be addressed to the District Veterinary Officer at Nyeri.

Cattle movement within the above-mentioned districts will be confined to dipped cattle in any area at the discretion of the District Veterinary Officer.

Permits for cattle to enter the above-mentioned districts must be countersigned by the District Veterinary Officer.

The owner of cattle not recognised by the Veterinary Department as immune to East Coast Fever shall not move such cattle from an area infected with East Coast Fever unless and until the following conditions have been fulfilled:—

(a) The cattle which the owner as aforesaid, or his duly authorised representative requires to move must have been dipped regularly, at intervals of 72 hours throughout a period of two months immediately preceding the date of the intending movement, in an efficient dipping fluid which contained not less than the equivalent of .072% arsenious oxide in the form of arsenite of soda; that is to say, in a dipping fluid which has not been more than 10% below the recognised standard strength which is .08% arsenious oxide in the form of arsenite of soda.

(b) The cattle to be moved must have had an efficient tick-destroying dressing thoroughly applied to the insides of their ears and under the roots of their tails every six days throughout the aforesaid period of two months.

(c) A certificate must be furnished in triplicate to a Veterinary Officer in the form set forth in Schedule B, appended hereto, specifying the cattle which it is proposed to move, the area into which it is proposed to move them, the date of the proposed movement and declaring that the cattle to be moved have been regularly dipped and dressed as aforesaid.

It shall be within the discretion of the Veterinary Officer to whom the application for a permit is made to withhold a permit absolutely or to satisfy himself in such manner as he may think fit before granting a permit that the dipping fluid is effective and that the conditions with regard to dipping and the strength of the dipping fluid have in point of fact been observed. Cattle permitted to move from an area infected with East Coast Fever to an area free from East Coast Fever under the preceding section must enter the area free from East Coast Fever within 72 hours of their last dipping.
