GOVERNMENT NOTICE NO 545

HIS Excellency the Governor has approved of the following Bill being introduced into Legislative Council

G R SANDFORD,

Clerk of the Legislative Council

A Bill to Provide for the Holding of Investigations in Cases of Fire

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows —

1 This Ordinance may be cited as ' the Fire Inquiry Short title Ordinance, 1929 '

2 Whenever any fire causing injury to person or property shall take place in any part of the Colony,
5 it shall be the duty of the officer or constable of police to whom such fire shall first become known to repair himself or to send some other member of the police force forthwith to the spot where such fire shall have occurred, and the officer or constable who shall so repair to the spot, after
10 performing such services as he may be required to perform in the due execution of his duty as an officer or constable of police, shall make all due inquiry into the origin or cause of such fire

Police officer or constable to repair to any fire and to make due inquiry into cause thereof

3 Such officer or constable of police shall receive the
15 statements of any person or persons who is or are able to give information respecting such fire

To receive statements of any person able to give information

4 Such officer or constable of police shall further, so soon after as he conveniently can fill up the form given in the Schedule to this Ordinance and shall attach thereto the
20 substance of any information given to him as to the origin or cause of the fire

To fill up soon after, form in Schedule

5 Such officer or constable of police shall so soon as convenient, but not later than twenty-four hours from the time of his attending the fire forward to the Commissioner
25 of Police for transmission to the magistrate of a subordinate court of the first or second class exercising jurisdiction in the district in which such fire shall have taken place, the form filled up by him under section 4 of this Ordinance

To forward form to Commissioner of Police for magistrate's information

6 The magistrate to whom the said form shall have
30 been transmitted shall, if he think fit, or if an information on oath is made to the effect that the informant has reasonable grounds for believing not only that the fire was unlawfully and maliciously set but that he knows the person who set it, fix an early day for holding an investigation into the origin
35 or cause of the fire so reported

Holding inquiry

7 Such investigation may be held in the subordinate court of the first or second class of the district in which the fire took place or should the magistrate see any sufficient ground for holding it where the fire occurred and consider
40 it expedient so to do, it shall be lawful for him, with the consent of the owner or person in charge of such place, to so hold it accordingly

8 It shall be lawful for the magistrate to issue sum-
monses free of charge to any witnesses that he may deem
proper to attend any such investigation at such place as the
magistrate may fix, any such summonses to be served in the
same manner as are other summonses issuing from the
subordinate courts, and any person disobeying any summons
may be proceeded against in like manner and be subject to
the like penalties as provided for in the Criminal Procedure
Ordinance, and the provisions of such Ordinance generally
which relate to inquiries into cases triable by the Supreme
Court shall, so far as is possible consistently with the provisions
of this Ordinance apply to proceedings under this Ordinance

OBJECTS AND REASONS

A disastrous fire broke out in the township of Nairobi early in the year 1926, and a Commission was appointed to inquire into the causes thereof. The Commission reported to the Governor in due course, and paragraph 28 of the Report read as follows —

“ As a rider to this report, we suggest that legislation should be introduced providing that in cases of fire causing loss or damage a fire inquest should be held by a magistrate of the first or second class working in the district in which the fire occurred, the magistrate having discretion in the matter of whether or not an inquest is necessary or desirable ”

This Bill has been framed to meet the recommendation contained in the above paragraph of the Report

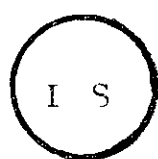

DESCRIPTION OF WARD BOUNDARIES

I —GILGIL NORTH

Commencing on the north-west boundary of the Council area at the southern corner of L R No 3985,

thence bounded northerly, easterly and south-easterly by the Council boundary to the summit of Satimma,

thence south-westerly by a straight line to the north-east corner of L R No 3777/62,

thence by the northern boundary of that portion to its north-west corner,

thence south-westerly by a straight line to the south-east corner of L R No 3777/49,

thence westerly by the southern boundaries of sub-divisions Nos 49, 48 and 47 of L R No 3777,

thence southerly by part of the western boundary of L R No 6254 to the north-east corner of L R No 6252,

thence westerly by the northern boundaries of L R Nos 6252 and 6222,

thence northerly by part of the eastern boundary of L R No 5278 to its north-east corner,

thence westerly by the northern boundary of L R No 5278,

thence northerly by part of the eastern boundary of L R No 6559 to its north-east corner,

thence westerly by the northern boundaries of L R Nos 6559 and 6205,

thence northerly by part of the western boundary of L R No 6221 to the south-east corner of L R No 1256/2,

thence south-westerly and northerly by the southern and western boundaries of the latter portion,

thence westerly by part of the northern boundary of L R No 439 to the point of commencement

II —GILGIL SOUTH

Commencing on the southern boundary of Gilgil North Ward at the north-west corner of L R No 5252,

thence bounded easterly by that ward boundary to the summit of Satimma,

thence southerly by the Council boundary to a point due east of the eastern corner of L R No 3777/58,

thence due west to that corner,

thence south-westerly by the south-eastern boundary of that portion to its southern corner,

thence north-westerly by part of the south-western boundary of the same portion to the south-east corner of L R No 3989

thence by the southern or south-eastern boundaries of that portion and of L R No 5295

thence by a straight line south-westerly across L R No 423 to the intersection of the centre line of the Kenya and Uganda Railway with the Gilgil River,

thence by a straight line westerly across L R Nos 423 and 422 to the northern corner of L R No 1377,

thence northerly, south-westerly and again northerly by the generally western boundaries of L R No 422 extended to low water mark in Lake Elmenteta,

thence south-easterly and northerly by that low water mark to its intersection with the northern boundary of L R No 438 extended thereto,

thence north-easterly by that extended boundary to the point of commencement

III —LAKE WARD

Commencing at the intersection of the generally southern boundary of L R No 1856 with the western boundary of the Council area,

thence bounded easterly by that generally southern boundary to the eastern corner of that portion,

thence in a generally northerly direction by part of the north-western boundary of L R No 419 and the south-western and north-western boundaries of L R No 1377 to its northern corner,

thence easterly by part of the southern boundary of the Gilgil South Ward to its intersection with the western boundary of the Nakuru-Naivasha Road Reserve,

thence south-easterly by that road reserve to its intersection with the Naivasha Township boundary

thence southerly and easterly by the western and southern boundaries of Naivasha Township to north-west corner of L R No 1556,

thence southerly and westerly by the western boundaries of L R Nos 1553, 1555 and parts of the north-western boundary of L R No 1551 and the northern boundary of L R No 1024 to the eastern 100-foot zone of the Kenya and Uganda Railway,

thence southerly by that zone to the south-west corner of L R No 1550,

thence westerly across the Kenya and Uganda Railway to the eastern corner of L R No 1954,

thence westerly by the southern and western boundaries of that portion part of the southern boundary of L R No 404 and parts of the eastern and southern boundaries of L R No 1790 to the south-west corner of the last,

thence westerly by a straight line to the eastern corner of L R No 2662 on the Council boundary,

thence northerly by the Council boundary to the point of commencement

IV —NAIVASHA WARD

Commencing at the intersection of the western boundary of the Nakuru-Naivasha Road Reserve with the southern boundary of the Gilgil South Ward,

thence bounded easterly by that ward boundary to the northern corner of L R No 1014,

thence southerly by the north-eastern and part of the south-eastern boundaries of that portion to the northern corner of L R No 6506,

thence southerly by the eastern boundaries of L R Nos 6506 and 6505,

thence south-easterly by the south-western boundaries of L R Nos 1294/1, 3787, 3786 and 1297,

thence south-westerly by the north-western boundary of L R No 5239,

thence south-easterly by the south-western or western boundaries of L R Nos 5239, 1960, 6236, 3480, 5256, 5257, 1309/1, 1309/2, 1310, 1311, 1312 to the western corner of the last,

thence by a straight line across L R No 1548 and the Kenya and Uganda Railway to the north-west corner of L R No 2976/7,

thence by the southern or western 100-foot reserve of the Kenya and Uganda Railway to its intersection with the southern boundary of the Lake Ward at the eastern corner of L R 1954,

thence northerly by the eastern boundary of the Lake Waid to its intersection with the southern boundary of Naivasha Township,

thence easterly, northerly and north-westerly by that township boundary of its intersection with the eastern boundary of the Lake Ward,

thence northerly by that ward boundary to the point of commencement

V —KINANGOP WARD

Commencing at the intersection of the southern boundary of the Lake Ward with the Council boundary,

thence bounded easterly by that ward boundary to its intersection with the south-western boundary of the Naivasha Ward boundary,

thence south-easterly and northerly by the latter ward boundary to its intersection with the south-eastern boundary of the Gilgil South Ward,

thence north-easterly by the south-eastern boundary of the latter ward to its intersection with the Council boundary,

thence southerly and north-westerly by the Council Ward to the point of commencement

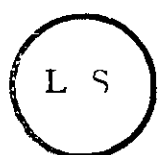

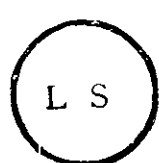

DESCRIPTION OF WARD BOUNDARIES

1 — *Ravine Ward*

Commencing at the intersection of the south-western boundary of L R No 662 with the northern boundary of the Council area,

thence bounded south-easterly by the south-eastern boundary of L R No 662 to its intersection with the River Molo,

thence bounded by that river up-stream to its intersection with the north boundary of the Ravine-Nakuru Road Reserve,

thence by that road reserve boundary north-westerly to the southern corner of L R No 5641,

thence south-westerly by a straight line across that road reserve to the northern corner of L R No 487/26 and onwards by the north-western boundaries of that sub-division and of sub-divisions Nos 27, 28, 29 30/1, 31/1, 32, 33 (L R No 5620), 34 and 35 of L R No 487 to the south-west corner of the last,

thence by a straight line westerly to the southern corner of L R No 3917,

thence northerly by part of the western boundary of L R No 504 (Forest Concession) to its north-west corner,

thence westerly by part of the southern boundary of L R No 503 (Forest Concession),

thence northerly by part of the western boundary of that Forest Concession to the south-east corner of L R No 4143,

thence by the south-eastern boundary of the latter portion to its intersection with the generally western boundary of the Council area,

thence north-westerly, northerly, and generally easterly by the Council boundary to the point of commencement

(The Township of Eldama Ravine, which lies within the foregoing described area, is excluded therefrom)

2 —*Lower Molo Ward*

Commencing at the intersection of the south-western boundary of L R No 662 with the northern boundary of the Council area,

thence bounded northerly and south-easterly by that Council area to the north-west corner of L R No 5260,

thence southerly by the western boundaries of L R Nos 5260, 478 and 3951,

thence easterly by the southern boundaries of L R Nos 3951 and 3950,

thence southerly and easterly by parts of the western and southern boundaries of L R No 1330 to the north-west corner of L R No 1332,

thence southerly by the western boundary of L R Nos 1332 and 1335 to the south-west corner of the latter,

thence north-westerly by the south-west boundaries of L R Nos 1334/2 and 1020/1 to the western corner of the latter,

thence south-westerly by the eastern boundaries of L R Nos 487/5, 487/1 and 5204 to the most southern corner of the last portion,

thence westerly by the generally south-western boundary of L R No 5204 to the Rongai River,

thence by that river up-stream to its intersection with the south-western boundary of L R No 5668,

thence north-westerly by that boundary to the Molo River,

thence by that river down-stream to its intersection with the south-western boundary of L R No 6704 (487/32),

thence north-westerly by that boundary to its intersection with the eastern boundary of Ravine Ward,

thence north-easterly by that ward boundary to the point of commencement

3 —Rongai Ward

Commencing at the western corner of L R No 487/32 (6704),

thence bounded south-easterly by the southern boundary of the Lower Molo Ward to the most southern corner of L R No 5204,

thence south-westerly by a straight line across the Kenya and Uganda (Uasin Gishu) Railway to the north-east corner of L R No 4575/R (5205) and onwards by the south-eastern boundary of that portion and those of sub-divisions Nos 50, 51, 52/2, 52/1, and 53 of L R No 487 and of L R No 4819 to the south-east corner of the last,

thence westerly by the southern boundary of the last portion to its south-west corner,

thence southerly by the western boundaries of Nos 487/78/1 and 2 to the northern 100-foot zone of the Kenya and Uganda Railway,

thence westerly by that 100-foot zone to its intersection with the eastern boundary of Elburgon Township,

thence north-westerly by the generally north-eastern and the north-western boundaries of that township to the northern 100-foot zone of the Kenya and Uganda Railway,

thence westerly by that zone to its intersection with the Mau Stream,

thence down that stream to the southern corner of L R No 487/3/15,

thence north-westerly by the south-western boundaries of L R Nos 487/3/15 and part of that of L R No 487/3/16 to the intersection of the latter with the southern boundary of L R No 487/3/2/R,

thence westerly and north-easterly by the southern and north-western boundaries of L R No 487/3/2/R and the north-western boundaries of L R Nos 5611, 487/3/1/1 and 487/3/1/2 to the northern corner of the last,

thence westerly by part of the south-eastern boundary of L R No 487/35 to its south-west corner,

thence north-easterly by part of the south-western boundary of the Ravine Ward to the point of commencement

4 —Molo-Mau Summit Ward

Commencing on the western boundary of the Council area at the most southern corner of L R No 4143,

thence bounded south-easterly by the south-western and southern boundary of the Ravine Ward to its intersection with the western boundary of the Rongai Ward,

thence southerly by the latter ward boundary to the northern 100-foot zone of the Kenya and Uganda Railway,

thence by a straight line across the railway to the most northern corner of L R No 531/11,

thence south-easterly by part of the northern boundary of that portion,

thence south-westerly by the south-eastern boundaries of sub-divisions Nos 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 31 of L R No 531 to the southern corner of the last,

thence southerly by a straight line through the Eastern Mau Forest Reserve to the northern corner of L R No 4602,

thence by the generally eastern boundaries of L R Nos 4602, 4603, and part of that of 4597 to the southern boundary of the Council area,

thence south-westerly and generally north-easterly by the Council boundary to the point of commencement

(The Township of Molo, which lies within the foregoing described area, is excluded therefrom)

5 — *Njoro Ward*

Commencing on the southern boundary of the Council area at the south-west corner of L R No 3736 (Forest Reserve),

thence bounded northerly by the eastern boundary of the Molo-Mau Summit Ward to its intersection with the southern boundary of the Rongai Ward,

thence bounded easterly and northerly by the southern and eastern boundaries of that ward to the intersection of the latter with the southern boundary of the Lower Molo Ward,

thence northerly and south-easterly by the southern boundary of the Lower Molo Ward to its south-east corner at the south-west corner of L R No 1335,

thence by the western boundaries of L R Nos 5220 and 6211 to the Njoro River,

thence by that river up-stream to its intersection with the eastern boundary of L R No 2974/1/1,

LOCUST REPORT TO 21ST AUGUST, 1929

HOPPER AREAS

Karamoja, Uganda —Fresh laying on a small scale has taken place in the Lokitanyalla area

Northern Turkana —Fresh hatchings are reported in the Campi-ya-Simba and Lorogum areas, in the latter place, bands are large and numerous. Further laying has taken place in the vicinity of Kakuma Road as far as Loriki

Southern Turkana —Work is proceeding on laying areas in Loiapau-Turkwell, Nabeye-Kerio, Kataleai, Kalonyat, and Lotongot areas. Hopper destruction taking place in the Lokorogot, Loiya, Kataleai and Naoikan areas—these young hoppers are delayed hatchings from eggs laid in March. In this district Locust Officers find burning as effective as baiting or spraying

West Suk —Five officers are still working on hoppers in the north

Elgeyo-Marakwet —The only hoppers remaining in Marakwet are at Kituswa on the Marakwet-Elgeyo border. In Elgeyo, hoppers remain in the Kapchemutwa, Kiptain and Mutei areas only. Disease has appeared in hoppers and fliers. The flying escapes are moving into the Kerio Valley. No swarms have been seen. In this district spraying has been found most effective, and baiting is done only where water is scarce. Beating has been carried out in Kibuswa on the almost vertical slopes in waterless localities

Ravine-Masai Reserve —Bran baiting was carried out successfully on six small swarms of young flying locusts in the neighbourhood of Mogotio, and on seven swarms, both north and south of the Ravine-Nakuru Road

Baringo —Large number of hoppers are now found on a 40 mile front from Pakka and Kapeddo, northwards along the Suguta Valley, and on the hills on either side. The main base has been moved from Marigat to a point fifty-two miles north in Kapeddo. Large quantities of supplies have been moved to the new base. There is a staff of 39 officers working between Ravine and Karamoja. An aerial photographic survey of the country from Baringo to the Sudan border would prove very helpful, in that routes, to serve areas at present roadless could be laid down with more certainty, and to greater advantage

Northern Frontier Province —Captain Parker has left for Marsabit to take up reconnaissance work in that area. Specimens of a weed which appears to cause sickness in hoppers have been sent in from Kerio

FLYING LOCUSTS

Two swarms of yellow locusts passed near Lodwar flying east. Several swarms have passed over Lakitanyalla, coming from the south-west, and proceeding north-east

A small swarm has entered the Sabukia Valley and is damaging a field of 90 acres of maize. There is a small swarm in Solai

The Upper Molo swarm filtered into Ravine, and then passed over the Ravine Masai Reserve, picking up patches of fliers, finally settling on a farm in Rongai. Little damage was done. The swarm split, a portion moving off towards Njoro, the balance returning towards Sabatia, where it should join up with another portion of a swarm on the Esageri River

There is a moderate sized swarm in the Kikuyu Reserve behind Ruiru. Large quantities of locusts are being collected and sold to Kavondo working on estates in the neighbourhood. Reports of swarms varying in size from 10 acres to 50 acres in extent when roosting have come in from Thika. The recent rain dispersed swarms

A small swarm moved about in North Kenya, but departed without doing any damage. The swarms reported from Buet have moved into the Mau Forest, they may be expected over Mo'o

Up-to-date reports state little or no damage, save for 90 acres in Subukia Valley which has been badly damaged

It is to be remarked that relatively, swarms are not numerous, and are of restricted dimensions. Should no further influx from the north or south take place, the likelihood of heavy damage is not great

Recent reports from Tanganyika state that swarms continue to move in a north-easterly direction, so that further infestation may be anticipated

Smoke candles ready for despatch at the end of June, are still awaiting shipment as explosives. Efforts have been and are still being made to devise a formula, using materials obtainable locally

It would be of great assistance if people who kindly report the presence of flying swarms would report in the following way —
