KENYA PROCLAMATIONS RULES AND REGULATIONS

Section 16 of the Principal Ordinance which it is proposed to amend —

16 No person shall keep a private warehouse for arms or ammunition without a licence from an authorized officer and the fee for such licence shall be twenty shillings

Section 22 of the Principal Ordinance which it is proposed to amend —

22 No arms shall be repaired except at Government arsenals or at arsenals or establishments licensed by the Governor for that purpose. Before such a licence is granted guarantee shall be given for the observance of the rules of the Convention in such form as the Governor shall direct

Provided that nothing in this section shall be deemed to prohibit a person repairing arms belonging to himself with or without assistance

A Bill to Amend the Arms and Ammunition Ordinance, 1925

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows —

1 This Ordinance may be cited as “the Arms and Ammunition (Amendment) Ordinance, 1933,” and shall be read as one with the Arms and Ammunition Ordinance, 1925, hereinafter referred to as “the Principal Ordinance”

2 Section 16 of the Principal Ordinance is hereby amended by the addition at the end thereof of the following —

“Every licence granted under this section shall expire on the 31st day of December next following the day of issue. No fee shall be payable on the renewal of a licence under this section in respect of premises which were licensed before the 31st day of December, 1932.”

3 Section 22 of the Principal Ordinance, as amended by the Arms and Ammunition (Amendment) Ordinance, 1926, is hereby further amended by the addition at the end thereof of the following —

“Every licence granted under this section shall expire on the 31st day of December next following the day of issue. No fee shall be payable on the renewal of a licence under this section in respect of premises which were licensed before the 31st day of December, 1932.”

OBJECTS AND REASONS

The object of this Bill is to make the licences for private arsenals or establishments to repair arms, and for private warehouses, renewable annually.

No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law.

Sub-section (3) of section 10 of the Principal Ordinance which it is proposed to amend —

(3) If within a reasonable time not exceeding three months from the date on which a vagrant was committed to a house of detention no suitable employment has been obtained for and accepted by him, if such vagrant is a native of the Colony, the Governor in Council may order him to be returned to the area (if any), reserved for the use of his tribe or sub-tribe and he shall be returned accordingly, and any native who after having been returned to the area reserved for the use of his tribe or sub-tribe leaves such reserve, without the licence in writing of the senior commissioner of the province in which such reserve is situated first had and obtained, shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to imprisonment of either description for a term not exceeding six months

Sub-section (3) of section 11 of the Principal Ordinance which it is proposed to amend —

(3) Any native who after being returned under this section to the area reserved for the use of his tribe or sub-tribe leaves such area without the licence in writing of the senior commissioner of the province in which such reserve is situated shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to imprisonment of either description not exceeding six months

1 This Ordinance may be cited as ‘ the Vagrancy (Amendment) Ordinance, 1933 ’ and shall be read as one with the Vagrancy Ordinance (Chapter 63 of the Revised Edition), hereinafter referred to as “ the Principal Ordinance ”

OBJECTS AND REASONS

Under the Principal Ordinance a native who is ordered to return to his reserve, by reason of an offence against the Ordinance, cannot thereafter leave the reserve to find employment unless he obtains a licence in writing from the Senior Commissioner of the Province

2 The object of this Bill is to simplify the procedure by extending to District Commissioners the power to issue these licences. Opportunity has been taken to substitute the title “ Provincial Commissioner ” for “ Senior Commissioner ”

3 No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law

A Bill to Amend the Dangerous Petroleum Tax Ordinance

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows —

Short title **1** This Ordinance may be cited as “ the Dangerous Petroleum Tax (Amendment) Ordinance 1933,” and shall be read as one with the Dangerous Petroleum Tax Ordinance (Chapter 54 of the Revised Edition), hereinafter referred to as “ the Principal Ordinance ”

Repayment of tax in certain cases **2** The amount of tax paid under the Principal Ordinance in respect of dangerous petroleum which is used for fuelling aircraft which are operated by a company for the carriage of goods or passengers between places within the Colony or between places in the Colony and places outside the Colony shall be repayable to the person by whom such tax was paid on proof by him to the satisfaction of the Treasurer that the dangerous petroleum in respect of which such repayment of tax is claimed has been used solely in respect of journeys or parts of journeys which lie outside the boundaries of the Colony

For the purposes of this section “ company ” means any company incorporated or registered under any law in force in the Colony and any company which, though incorporated or registered outside the Colony, carries on business or has an office or place of business therein

Repeal **3** The Dangerous Petroleum Tax (Amendment)
No 57 of 1930 Ordinance, 1930, is hereby repealed

OBJECTS AND REASONS

By Ordinance 57 of 1930 Government granted to Imperial Airways, Limited exemption from payment of the Dangerous Petroleum Tax in respect of petroleum used in connexion with such portions of their service as lie outside the boundaries of the Colony. It is now proposed to extend a similar concession to any company

No expenditure of public moneys will be involved if the provisions of this Bill become law, but the loss in revenue is estimated at £100 a year

**A Bill to carry out Certain Conventions relating
to the Employment of Women, Young Persons
and Children**

WHEREAS at Washington on the Twenty-eighth day of November, Nineteen hundred and Nineteen, the General Conference of the International Labour Organization of the League of Nations adopted three conventions containing (together with other provisions) the provisions set out in Part I, Part II and Part III of the Schedule to this Ordinance Preamble

AND WHEREAS at Genoa the General Conference of the International Labour Organization of the League of Nations on the Ninth day of July, Nineteen hundred and Twenty, adopted a convention containing (together with other provisions) the provisions contained in Part IV of the Schedule to this Ordinance

AND WHEREAS at Geneva the General Conference of the International Labour Organization of the League of Nations on the Eleventh day of November, Nineteen hundred and Twenty-one adopted a convention containing (together with other provisions) the provisions contained in Part V of the Schedule to this Ordinance

AND WHEREAS power is given under the Conventions hereinbefore mentioned to modify the terms of any such Convention in their application to Colonies, Protectorates and Possessions which are not fully self-governing, for the purpose of making same applicable to local conditions

AND WHEREAS it is expedient that for the purpose of giving effect to the said Conventions the provisions hereinafter contained should have effect

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Governor of the Colony of Kenya, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows —

Short title **1** This Ordinance may be cited as ‘ the Employment of Women Young Persons and Children Ordinance, 1933 ’

Interpretation **2** In this Ordinance unless the context otherwise requires —

child ’ means a person under the age of fourteen years,

“ young person ” means a person who has ceased to be a child and who is under the age of eighteen years,

woman ” means a woman of the age of eighteen years or upwards,

employment ’ means employment in any labour exercised for the purposes of gain whether the gain be to the child, young person or woman, as the case may be, or to any other person,

‘ industrial undertaking ’ has, with respect to the employment of children, young persons and women, the meanings respectively assigned thereto in the Convention set out in Parts I, II and III of the Schedule to this Ordinance

Cap 108 “ native vessel ” has the meaning assigned to that term in the Native Vessels Ordinance,

duly authorized officer ” means any officer appointed by the Governor for the purposes of this Ordinance,

‘ competent authority ’ means the Governor in Executive Council

Savings **3** (1) The provisions of this Ordinance shall be in addition to and not in derogation of any of the provisions of any other Ordinance restricting the employment of women, young persons, or children

(2) Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall apply to an industrial undertaking or a ship in which only members of the same family are employed

(3) Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall prevent the employment in any industrial undertaking or ship of a child lawfully so employed at the commencement of this Ordinance

4 (1) No child under the age of twelve shall be employed in any industrial undertaking

(2) No child shall be employed in any industrial undertaking, in attendance on any machinery, or in any open-cast workings or sub-surface workings which are entered by means of a shaft or adit

(3) Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-section (1) of this section the Governor in Council may by order prohibit the employment of any child in any specified trade or industrial undertaking

(4) No child shall be employed in any ship except to the extent to which and in the circumstances in which such employment is permitted under the Convention set out in Part IV of the Schedule to this Ordinance

Provided that the provisions of this sub-section shall not apply in the case of a child who is employed in a native vessel or is under the care of a relative who is a member of the crew of the same vessel, if such relative is, in the opinion of a duly authorized officer, a fit and proper person to have charge of such child

(5) No young person or woman shall be employed at night in any industrial undertaking, except to the extent to which and in the circumstances in which such employment is permitted under the conventions set out in Part II and Part III respectively of the Schedule to this Ordinance
Provided that in the application to the Colony of the Convention set out in Part II of the Schedule to this Ordinance Article 2 shall not apply to male young persons

(6) Where young persons are employed in any industrial undertaking a register of the young persons so employed, of their ages or apparent ages, and of the dates on which they enter or leave the service of their employer, shall be kept, and shall at all times be open to inspection by any duly authorized officer

(7) The master of every ship shall, if young persons under the age of sixteen years are employed therein, keep a register of those persons with particulars of their ages or apparent ages and of the dates on which they become or cease to be members of the crew, and the register so kept shall be open to inspection by any authorized officer. Provided that this sub-section shall not apply to the master of a native vessel

5 (1) Subject to the provisions of Articles 3 and 4 of the Convention set out in Part V of the Schedule to this Ordinance, no young person shall be employed on work as a trimmer or stoker in any ship

(2) The master of every ship shall, if young persons are so employed therein keep a register of those persons with particulars of their ages or apparent ages and of the dates on which they become or cease to be members of the crew

Penalties

6 (1) If any person employs a child or a young person in any industrial undertaking in contravention of this Ordinance he shall be liable for each offence to a fine not exceeding two pounds, or, in the case of a second or subsequent offence, not exceeding five pounds, and where a child is taken into employment in any industrial undertaking in contravention of this Ordinance on the production by or with the privity of the parent, of a false or forged certificate, or on the false representation of his parent that the child or young person is of an age at which such employment is not in contravention of this Ordinance, that parent shall be liable to a fine not exceeding two pounds

(2) If any child is employed in any ship, or any young person is employed as a trimmer or stoker in any ship in contravention of this Ordinance the master of the ship shall be liable for each offence to a fine not exceeding two pounds, or, in the case of a second or subsequent offence, not exceeding five pounds, and where a child or young person, as the case may be, is taken into employment in any ship in contravention of this Ordinance on the production, by or with the privity of the parent, of a false or forged certificate, or on the false representation of his parent that the child or young person is of an age at which such employment is not in contravention of this Ordinance that parent shall be liable to a fine not exceeding two pounds

(3) If any person employs a woman in contravention of this Ordinance he shall be liable to a fine of twenty pounds

(4) If any person who is by this Ordinance required to keep a register fails to keep such a register, or refuses or neglects when required, to produce it for inspection by a duly authorized officer he shall be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds

7 (1) If it appears to any magistrate on the complaint of a duly authorized officer, that there is reasonable cause to believe that a child is employed in contravention of this Ordinance in any place, whether a building or not, such magistrate may by order under his hand empower such officer to enter into such place at any reasonable time, and examine such place or any person therein, touching the employment of any child therein

(2) Any person refusing admission to an officer authorized by an order under this section, or obstructing him in the discharge of his duty, shall for each offence be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds

8 If in a charge for an offence under this Ordinance it is alleged that the child or young person in respect of whom the offence was committed was under the age of fourteen or sixteen, as the case may be, at the date of the commission of the alleged offence, such person shall for the purposes of this Ordinance be presumed at that date to have been under the age of fourteen or sixteen, as the case may be, unless the contrary is proved

SCHEDULE

PART I

CONVENTION FIXING MINIMUM AGE FOR ADMISSION OF CHILDREN TO INDUSTRIAL EMPLOYMENT

Article 1

For the purpose of this Convention the term " industrial undertaking " includes particularly —

- (a) Mines, quarries, and other works for the extraction of minerals from the earth
- (b) Industries in which articles are manufactured, altered, cleaned, repaired, ornamented, finished, adapted for sale, broken up or demolished, or in which materials are transformed, including shipbuilding, and the generation, transformation, and transmission of electricity and motive power of any kind
- (c) Construction, reconstruction, maintenance, repair, alteration, or demolition of any building, railway, tramway, harbour, dock, pier, canal, inland waterway, road, tunnel, bridge, viaduct, sewer, drain,

well, telegraphic or telephonic installation, electrical undertaking, gas work, water work, or other work of construction, as well as the preparation for or laying the foundations of any such work or structure

- (d) Transport of passengers or goods by road or rail or inland waterway, including the handling of goods at docks, quays, wharves, and warehouses, but excluding transport by hand

The competent authority in each country shall define the line of division which separates industry from commerce and agriculture

Article 2

Children under the age of fourteen years shall not be employed or work in any public or private industrial undertaking, or in any branch thereof, other than an undertaking in which only members of the same family are employed

Article 3

The provisions of Article 2 shall not apply to work done by children in technical schools, provided that such work is approved and supervised by public authority

Article 4

In order to facilitate the enforcement of the provisions of this Convention, every employer in an industrial undertaking shall be required to keep a register of all persons under the age of sixteen years employed by him, and of the dates of their birth

PART II

CONVENTION CONCERNING THE NIGHT WORK OF YOUNG PERSONS EMPLOYED IN INDUSTRY

Article 1

For the purpose of this Convention the term " industrial undertaking " includes particularly —

- (a) Mines, quarries, and other works for the extraction of minerals from the earth

- (b) Industries in which articles are manufactured, altered, cleaned, repaired, ornamented, finished, adapted for sale, broken up or demolished, or in which materials are transformed, including ship-building, and the generation, transformation, and transmission of electricity or motive power of any kind
- (c) Construction, reconstruction, maintenance, repair, alteration, or demolition of any building, railway, tramway, harbour, dock, pier, canal, inland waterway, road, tunnel, bridge, viaduct, sewer, drain, well, telegraphic or telephonic installation, electrical undertaking, gas work, water work, or other work of construction as well as the preparation for or laying the foundations of any such work or structure
- (d) Transport of passengers or goods by road or rail, including the handling of goods at docks, quays, wharves, and warehouses, but excluding transport by hand

The competent authority in each country shall define the line of division which separates industry from commerce and agriculture

Article 2

Young persons under eighteen years of age shall not be employed during the night in any public or private industrial undertaking, or in any branch thereof, other than an undertaking in which only members of the same family are employed, except as hereinafter provided for

Young persons over the age of sixteen may be employed during the night in the following industrial undertakings on work which by reason of the nature of the process is required to be carried out continuously day and night —

- (a) Manufacture of iron and steel, process in which reverberatory or regenerative furnaces are used, and galvanizing of sheet metal or wire (except the pickling process)
- (b) Glass works
- (c) Manufacture of paper
- (d) Manufacture of raw sugar
- (e) Gold mining reduction work

Article 3

For the purpose of this convention the term "night" signifies a period of at least eleven consecutive hours, including the interval between ten o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning

In coal and lignite mines work may be carried on in the interval between ten o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning, if an interval of ordinarily fifteen hours, and in no case of less than thirteen hours, separates two periods of work

Where night work in the baking industry is prohibited for all workers, the interval between nine o'clock in the evening and four o'clock in the morning may be substituted in the baking industry for the interval between ten o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning

Article 4

The provisions of Articles 2 and 3 shall not apply to the night work of young persons between the ages of sixteen and eighteen years in cases of emergencies which could not have been controlled or foreseen, which are not of a periodical character, and which interfere with the normal working of the industrial undertaking

Article 7

The prohibition of night work may be suspended by the Government, for young persons between the ages of sixteen and eighteen years, when in case of serious emergency the public interest demands it

*PART III**CONVENTION CONCERNING THE NIGHT WORK OF WOMEN
EMPLOYED IN INDUSTRY**Article 1*

For the purpose of this Convention the term "industrial undertaking" includes particularly —

- (a) Mines, quarries and other works for the extraction of minerals from the earth
- (b) Industries in which articles are manufactured, altered, cleaned, repaired, ornamented, finished, adapted for sale, broken up or demolished, or in

which materials are transformed, including ship-building and the generation, transformation and transmission of electricity or motive power of any kind

- (c) Construction, reconstruction maintenance, repair alteration, or demolition of any building, railway tramway, harbour, dock, pier canal inland waterway road tunnel, bridge viaduct, sewer, drain well, telegraphic or telephonic installation, electrical undertaking, gas work, water work or other work of construction, as well as the preparation for or laying the foundations of any such work or structure

The competent authority in each country shall define the line of division which separates industry from commerce and agriculture

Article 2

For the purpose of this Convention, the term "night" signifies a period of at least eleven consecutive hours, including the interval between ten o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning

Article 3

Women without distinction of age shall not be employed during the night in any public or private industrial undertaking, or in any branch thereof, other than an undertaking in which only members of the same family are employed

Article 4

Article 3 shall not apply—

- (a) In cases of *force majeure*, when in any undertaking there occurs an interruption of work which it was impossible to foresee, and which is not of a recurring character
- (b) In cases where the work has to do with raw materials or materials in course of treatment which are subject to rapid deterioration, when such night work is necessary to preserve the said materials from certain loss

Article 6

In industrial undertakings which are influenced by the seasons and in all cases where exceptional circumstances demand it, the night period may be reduced to ten hours on sixty days of the year

PART IV

CONVENTION FIXING THE MINIMUM AGE FOR ADMISSION OF
CHILDREN TO EMPLOYMENT AT SEA*Article 1*

For the purpose of this Convention the term " vessel " includes all ships, and boats, of any nature whatsoever, engaged in maritime navigation, whether publicly or privately owned, it excludes ships of war

Article 2

Children under the age of fourteen years shall not be employed or work on vessels other than vessels upon which only members of the same family are employed

Article 3

The provisions of Article 2 shall not apply to work done by children on school-ships or training-ships provided that such work is approved and supervised by public authority

Article 4

In order to facilitate the enforcement of the provisions of this Convention, every shipmaster shall be required to keep a register of all persons under the age of sixteen years employed on board his vessel, or a list of them in the articles of agreement and of the dates of their births

PART V

CONVENTION FIXING THE MINIMUM AGE FOR THE ADMISSION
OF YOUNG PERSONS TO EMPLOYMENT AS TRIMMERS
OR STOKERS*Article 1*

For the purpose of this Convention, the term " vessel " includes all ships and boats, of any nature whatsoever engaged in maritime navigation, whether publicly or privately owned it excludes ships of war

Article 2

Young persons under the age of eighteen years shall not be employed or work on vessels as trimmers or stokers

Article 3

The provisions of Article 2 shall not apply —

- (a) To work done by young persons on school-ships or on training-ships, provided that such work is approved and supervised by public authority,

- (b) To the employment of young persons on vessels mainly propelled by other means than steam,
- (c) To young persons of not less than sixteen years of age, who, if found physically fit after medical examination, may be employed as trimmers or stokers on vessels exclusively engaged in the coastal trade of India and of Japan, subject to regulations made after consultation with the most representative organizations of employers and workers in those countries

Article 4

When a trimmer or stoker is required in a port where young persons of less than eighteen years of age only are available, such young persons may be employed and in that case it shall be necessary to engage two young persons in place of the trimmer or stoker required. Such young persons shall be at least sixteen years of age.

Article 5

In order to facilitate the enforcement of the provisions of this Convention, every shipmaster shall be required to keep a register of all persons under the age of eighteen years employed on board his vessel, or a list of them in the articles of agreement, and of the dates of their births.

Article 6

Articles of agreement shall contain a brief summary of the provisions of this Convention.

Article 11

Each member of the International Labour Organization which ratifies the Convention engages to apply it to its colonies, possessions and protectorates, in accordance with the provisions of Article 421 of the Treaty of Versailles and of the corresponding Articles of the other Treaties of Peace.

OBJECTS AND REASONS

The objects and reasons sufficiently appear in the preamble to the Bill.

No expenditure of public money will be involved if the Bill becomes law.

(4) Annual estimates of revenue and expenditure on account of the Fund shall be framed by the Provincial Commissioner and shall be submitted to the Treasurer in sufficient time to admit of their consideration before the commencement of the year to which they relate

The object of the Bill is to make provision for —

- (a) the formation of a Tribal Police Rewards and Fines Fund on lines similar to those of the Kenya Police

disturbed districts or because by reason of the conduct of the inhabitants it is necessary to increase the number of tribal police

The reason for (a) is so as to assist the wives and families of deceased tribal officers, to reward meritorious acts to advance authorized recreation, etc

The reason for (b) is so as to enforce law and order in certain circumstances in the cheapest possible manner, e g where there is continual trespass of stock over a boundary. It also accords with the policy that native areas should, as far as possible, police themselves.

No expenditure of public moneys will be incurred if the provisions of this Bill become law

6 The interest due on loans outstanding from time to time and the sums required for their repayment shall be a charge on the general revenues and assets of the Colony

OBJECTS AND REASONS

The Bill is intended to safeguard the stability of the currency in terms of sterling by ensuring that the East African Currency Board will if occasion arises, be able to provide funds for meeting further redemptions of currency

The Board was created in 1920 to provide and maintain new currency linked with sterling to replace the Indian rupee which was then at a high premium in relation to sterling, and the German rupee in the former German East Africa which was essentially similar to and on a par with, the Indian rupee

In the course of the replacement of the former currency the value of the Indian rupee and the price of silver fell so greatly that the Currency Board's assets were from the start inadequate to afford complete cover for the new currency issued. The loss in respect of the Indian and German rupee coins alone amounted to £1 526,200. No practical difficulty would have arisen in normal times but the contraction of the currency during the last three years has resulted in an unexpected further drain on the Board's sterling resources, and in order that the Board may be in an assured position to carry out, in all circumstances, its primary purpose of maintaining the sterling value of the currency, it is proposed

that funds should be placed at its disposal by the three Governments concerned up to a maximum total amount of £1,500,000

The Bill is a precautionary measure, and use will be made of it only so far, if at all, as the necessity arises

Similar Bills will be introduced in the other two legislatures, and the proportions in which liability should be assumed by the three Governments have been assigned in the light mainly of the figures for trade and revenue over a period of years

It is proposed that an additional Regulation shall be made providing that when the Board are able to satisfy the Secretary of State that they are in a position to do so, they may, subject to the approval of the Secretary of State, pay to the Governments concerned such sums as may be available from time to time towards meeting the interest and repayment charges of the loans

The Bill provides for implementing section 3 (2) of the Currency Notes Ordinance (Chapter 44 of the Revised Edition of the Laws), it defines the Colony's obligations under that Ordinance but does not increase them. The question as to whether any cost will fall upon the Colony from year to year must depend upon whether circumstances require the provisions of the Bill to be put into effect, and upon the terms on which any money so required can be borrowed from time to time

RABIES PROGRESS REPORT.

9TH FEBRUARY, 1933.

Information received since the last report indicates that the rabies campaign should be pursued with the greatest energy and vigour, and that relaxation in any form must not be contemplated.

In one instance a native child was bitten by a jackal at Kipterri in the Kericho area, and there seems no doubt whatever that the jackal was rabid although confirmation is now impossible since the animal was not killed.

In the Kaniadoto Location of the South Kavirondo Reserve, a reliable native has reported that a dog suspected to be rabid entered his hut and attacked his own dog. It was a fortunate circumstance that both dogs were immediately killed, but unfortunately the heads were not preserved and could not be found by the officer to whom the case was reported.

Another incident, but not so suspicious, occurred in the North Mugirango Location, South Kavirondo Reserve. A child was admitted to Kisii Hospital, having been bitten by a dog. The history is that

the child interfered with the dog which had picked up poison bait and that the dog died shortly afterwards.

Two children were also bitten at Mumbo, but details are not yet available.

Sotik.—6,000 poison baits have been laid in the area comprising Location 14. 1,000 poison baits have been laid in the Kipterri area.

South Kavirondo.—It is reported that baiting has been completed in the Majoge Location and has accounted for an additional 250 dogs.

In the Bassi Location baiting is proceeding and has so far resulted in the destruction of 758 dogs, 34 hyenas, 82 jackals, 57 civets, and 9 mongooses. The Kisii tribesmen on the Masai Border have been found to possess large numbers of dogs which are kept as guards against cattle thefts. As will be seen by the above figures, considerable mortality has been effected, but it is reported that some dogs have been moved into the Masai country and adjoining Kisii Locations. It is not known to what extent such movement has taken place, but it is doubtful if more than a few such movements have occurred.

Baiting in the Kitutu and North Mugirango Locations has been completed and destruction as follows has been observed: 397 dogs, 11 jackals and 9 civets.

A report received from Mirogi states a number of dogs have been voluntarily brought in by natives for destruction. 2,480 poison baits were laid in the Kwabwai Location; the known results to date are 198 dogs, 4 wild cats, 6 jackals and 3 hyenas.

The Suna Location has been completely baited, and a portion of North Kanyamkago, but the results are not yet to hand.

800 baits have been distributed in the Kaniadoto Location with a known destruction of 42 dogs, 1 hyena and 3 jackals. It is also reported that the natives of Kaniadoto have been voluntarily destroying their dogs, especially since the incident of the attack on the native's dog in the hut.

The Kwabwai Location has been completely baited. 1,200 poison baits were laid and the known destruction is 147 dogs, 3 hyenas and 2 jackals.

Baiting is being continued in the Gwasssi, Kapringiri and Kasigunga Locations.

In the South Kisii-Tanganyika Border area, 8,130 baits have been distributed in the Nyabassi Location. Further destruction in the Buregi Location is reported to be 58 hyenas, 19 dogs, 23 jackals, 14 cats and mongooses. Baiting has been completed in the Buregi Location.

In the Nyabassi Location a small number of dogs were brought in voluntarily for destruction and 221 dogs were destroyed by feeding with poison baits, and in addition distribution of baits has accounted for 27 hyenas, 104 dogs, 6 jackals, 16 cats, etc.

Kibigori Area.—Baiting has been continued in the East Kano Location with further satisfactory results.

LOCUST REPORT

9TH FEBRUARY, 1933

Uganda—In Buganda hopper bands are still present in most counties but are more numerous in Singo than elsewhere. Action against them continues, but survivors are reaching the winged stage and an increase in fliers will shortly occur. A few swarms, including one mature, are reported.

A few further hatchings are notified from the Eastern and Western Provinces and small mature swarms are reported. In the Northern Province scattered hopper bands exist and a grass-burning campaign has had to be postponed owing to wet weather. The general direction of flying swarms in this Province appears to be westerly.

Tanganyika Territory—The position is little changed. Hopper bands are becoming more frequent, but operations for their destruction are in progress. In the Lake Province egg-laying is reported in the Nzega, Shinyanga, Maswa and Mwanza districts, while hopper bands exist in Bukoba, where a destruction campaign is in progress. Extensive flying swarms are in Tabora.

Destruction campaigns are being pursued in Iringa and Lindi Provinces. A maturing flying swarm is reported in Masailand near Longido, and two fairly large egg-laying swarms are in Singida district.

Except for the Lake Province, the situation in the Territory generally is considered to be satisfactory.

Kenya—There is little change in the situation since the last report was issued. Flying swarms are reported from Muhoroni, Nakuru and Rumuruti. Otherwise the country appears to be free of fliers.

Hoppers—Baiting on a small scale is in progress in Mukuyu and Enibu while beating operations are being carried on in Central Kavirondo, Muhoroni, Fort Hall and Michakos, further hatchings having been reported from Seme and Sakwa in Central Kavirondo. Hoppers have hatched in patches over an area of about 1 500 acres north of Kitale and further hatchings are expected after more rain. Bait supplies are available in Kitale.
