The Commissioner shall not give his approval unless he is satisfied that the proposals are such as to develop the land adequately and satisfactorily.

2. The lessee shall within six months of the actual registration of the lease submit in triplicate to the local authority and the Commissioner of Lands plans (including block plans showing the positions of the buildings and a system of drainage for the disposal of sewage, surface and sullage water), drawings, elevations and specifications of the buildings, the grantee proposes to erect on the land and shall within 24 months of the actual registration of the title complete the erection of such buildings and the construction of the drainage system in conformity with such plans, elevations and specifications as amended (if such be the case) by the Commissioner:

Provided that notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in or implied by the Trust Lands Act (Cap. 288), if default shall be made in the performance or observance of any of the requirements of this condition it shall be lawful by him on behalf of the County Council to re-enter into and upon the land or any part thereof in the name of the whole and thereupon the term hereby created shall cease but without prejudice to any right of action or remedy of the County Council in respect of any antecedent breach of any condition herein contained.

3. The lessee shall maintain in good and substantial repair and condition all buildings at any time erected on the land.

4. Should the grantee give notice in writing to the County Council that he is unable to complete the buildings within the period aforesaid, the Commissioner of Lands shall (at the grantee's expense) accept a surrender of the land comprised herein:

Provided further that in such notice as aforesaid shall be given—

- within 12 months of the actual registration of the title, the County Council shall refund to the grantee 50 per centum of the stand premium paid in respect of the land; or
- at any subsequent time prior to expiration of the said building period, the County Council shall refund to the grantee 25 per centum of the said stand premium. In the event of notice being given after the expiration of the said building period, no refund shall be made.

5. (a) The land and buildings shall only be used for one private dwelling house, excluding a guest house.

(b) The land and buildings shall only be used for shops (excluding a petrol station), office and flats.

(c) The land shall only be used for inoffensive industrial purpose with ancillary offices and stores.

6. The buildings shall not cover more than 75 per centum of the area of the land if used for shop and/or office purposes only or such lesser area as may be laid down by the local authority in its by-laws and not more than 50 per centum of the area of the land if used for the combined purposes of shops, offices and flats or such lesser area as may be laid down by the local authority in its by-laws. And not more than 50 per cent if used for residential purpose; and not more than 90 per cent if used for industrial purpose.

7. Accommodation not exceeding one hundred square feet may be provided for a caretaker or watchman in case of industrial purposes plots

The lessee shall not sell, transfer, sublet, charge or part with the possession of the land or any part thereof, except with the prior consent in writing of the Commissioner of Land, no application for such consent (except in respect of a loan required for building purposes) will be considered until Special Condition No. 2 has been performed:

Provided that such consent shall not be required for the letting of individual shops, offices and flats.

11. The lessee shall pay to the local authority on demand such sum as the local authority estimate to be the proportionate cost of construction and the ascertainment of the actual proportionate cost either pay (within seven days of demand) or be refunded the amount by which the actual proportionate cost exceeds or falls short of the amount paid as aforesaid.

12. The lessee shall from time to time pay to the local authority of lands on demand such proportion of the cost of maintaining all roads and drains serving or adjoining the lands as the local authority may assess.

13. Should the local authority at any time require the said roads to be constructed to a higher standard, the grantee shall pay to the Commissioner on demand such proportion of the cost of the construction as the local authority may assess.

14. The lessee shall pay such rates, taxes, charges, duties, assessments or outgoings of whatever description as may be imposed, charged or assessed by any Government or local authority upon the land or the buildings erected thereon, including any contribution or other sum paid by the President in lieu thereof.

15. The County Council or such person or authority as may be appointed for the purpose shall have the right to enter upon the land and lay and have access to water mains of all descriptions, whether overhead or underground, and the grantee shall not erect any building in such a way as to cover or interfere with any existing alignments of main or service pipes or telephone or telegraph wires and electric mains.

THE INDUSTRIAL COURT

CAUSE NO. 5 OF 1979

Parties:—

Kenya Management Staff Association

and

Standard Bank Limited

Issue in dispute:—

Termination of services of J. K. Mwangi.

1. The Kenya Management Staff Association shall hereinafter be referred to as the Claimants and Standard Bank Ltd. shall hereinafter be referred to as the Respondents.

2. The parties were heard in Nairobi on 13th and 30th March, 1979, and relied on their written and verbal submissions. The Claimants also called J. K. Mwangi to give evidence on oath.

AWARD

3. The Notification of Dispute Form "A" dated 23rd November, 1978, duly signed by the parties was received by the Court on 5th February, 1979, together with the statutory certificates signed by the Minister for Labour and the Labour Commissioner.

J. K. Mwangi was employed by the Respondents as a clerk on 3rd March, 1967, and was promoted to section head in 1969. In 1970 he proceeded to U.K. for six months for further training. In 1972 he was promoted to officer grade at Sh. 2,041/50. Thereafter he received a promotion and became an Assistant Manager and was posted at the Respondents' Kimathi Street branch. He was confirmed in this position on 5th February, 1976, at Sh. 5,300 p.m.—Grade 8.

He was placed on probation for Manager's position Grade 7—Sh. 6,518 p.m.—and transferred to Kitui as Branch Manager in June, 1976. His probation for this post was to be of six months' duration.

On 28th September, 1977, he was transferred to Mombasa and on 30th March, 1978, his services were terminated. His letter of termination stated as follows:—

"Further to our letter of 17th March, 1978, your continued disregard of the bank's instructions has been brought to the attention of the Board of Directors. They have noted that on three separate occasions you have declined to obey a proper order that you should assume control of our Makupa Agency.

Therefore the Board has directed that in the face of your continued insubordination which is in direct contravention of paragraph 2 (a) of your letter of appointment the bank is left with no alternative but to terminate your services with effect from the date you receive this letter.

One month's salary and housing allowance will be paid in lieu of notice together with proportionate payments in respect of local leave and local leave allowance. The payments will be credited to your central account, the balance of which will be transferred to your account at Treasury Square Branch, Mombasa, by telex."

The Claimants took up the matter on his behalf and the dispute was investigated by the Ministry of Labour and the Ministry's findings and conclusion were forwarded to the parties on 18th November, 1978, in the following terms:—

"Mr. Mwangi had a very successful career in the bank despite his formal education background. From the submissions and interviews carried out by the Investigator it was found out that as Mr. Mwangi became more senior he became more arrogant to the extent of hurting other employees and his superiors.

The complaint of shortages and excesses and an altered banker's order were serious enough to warrant dismissal considering his position in the bank. The bank has been sued for this and is trying to settle this out of court. This shows how the bank has been lenient on a man who shows no mercy to others and no regret. A staff at the Kitui branch has admitted and apologised for his role in altering the banker's order with the influence and command from Mr. Mwangi.

Mr. Mwangi obviously hurt the feelings of the Mombasa Branch Manager when he refused the transfer to Makupa Agency without a genuine reason except arrogance. An employee who disobeys a lawful order by a person placed above him/her commits an offence which could result to summary dismissal and in my opinion Mr. Mwangi's case fell in this category. He was therefore treated very leniently by the Management.

The Union's demand for reinstatement is therefore rejected. Also the claim for house allowance for the period 24th January to 21st June, 1977, during which period he was on leave having been in occupation of the institutional house prior to proceeding on leave is also rejected.

With regard to payment for the balance of 40 days' leave he was paid this which amounted to Sh. 9,544/15 and he has therefore no further claim against the Management.

Conclusion:

After very careful consideration of the matter at hand I am of the opinion that the action taken by the management was justified and Mr. Mwangi has got what he deserved and since he received payment of all his terminal benefits, he is not due any other payments."

The Claimants rejected these recommendations and the dispute is now before the Court.

The Claimants have vigorously submitted that all the allegations which the Respondents had levelled against Mr. Mwangi had never been substantiated by them and although they had repeatedly written to Mr. Mwangi saying that his attitude towards his work and his superiors left a lot to be desired it was never explained and proved in what respect Mr. Mwangi defaulted in the performance of his managerial duties.

The Claimants informed the Court that Mr. Mwangi proceeded on leave on 24th January, 1977, for five months and when he resumed his duties at Kitui on 21st June, 1977, he found numerous letters from the Respondents waiting for him and on 20th September, 1977, he was informed on telephone that another person was taking over the Kitui branch from him with immediate effect.

The Claimants added that when Mr. Mwangi was transferred to Mombasa where he arrived on 2nd October, 1977, he was not assigned any duties and in fact remained for four months up to January, 1978, without anything to do. The Claimants argued that in February, 1978, when he was told to go and work in one of the Respondents' Agencies at Makupa, Mr. Mwangi was greatly shocked because only clerks managed the Agencies and not persons who had risen to the position of Manager. They claimed that Mr. Mwangi was perfectly entitled to ask to be assigned with any relevant managerial duties which conformed to his grade.

The Claimants submitted that the Respondents were completely unjustified in terminating Mr. Mwangi's services in having treated him in the manner aforesaid and he had therefore suffered wrongful dismissal. They accordingly asked the Court to reinstate Mr. Mwangi to his former position with the Respondents without any loss from the date his services were terminated or alternatively he should be paid compensation in addition to other terminal benefits as follows:—

The Claimants called Mr. Mwangi to give evidence on oath and he denied the various allegations which the Respondents had made against him in their written submissions.

The Respondents submitted that Mr. Mwangi had committed serious irregularities while he was the Manager at their Kitui branch which they listed as follows:—

- “(a) Placing banned cashiers on telling duties contrary to the bank's instructions.
- (b) Forcing tellers personally to make good cash deficiencies contrary to both the bank's regulations and collective agreement with the union.
- (c) Taking large amounts of cash from tellers and placing these amounts in his custody without accounting for it in complete disregard of the bank's regulations. This action was highly irregular and was a serious risk to all concerned.
- (d) Giving false information to a customer's lawyer by tendering a substituted banker's order.
- (e) Dishonouring a customer's banker's order whilst sufficient funds were available on due date.
- (f) Absenting himself from the branch and sending off staff on 19th July, 1977, whilst his senior, the Area Manager, was on a routine visit to the branch.
- (g) A new treasury cash safe delivered to the branch on 24th June, 1977, with instructions from the Administrative Office to bring this into immediate use was found not in use when the Area Manager visited the branch on 2nd September, 1977. It was lying open with both sets of keys inside. The treasury case was being kept in a small cupboard. Despite the Area Manager's further instructions on 2nd September, 1977, this had still not been brought into use when the Inspectors visited the branch on 7th September, 1977, and the treasury cash was therefore not fully protected.”

The Respondents, however, pointed out that despite the above irregularities committed by Mr. Mwangi at Kitui branch his services were not terminated on account of them. He suffered a termination because of his repeated disobedience of instructions at the Treasury Square branch, Mombasa, when he was asked to assume control of Makupa Agency by the Mombasa Manager.

The Respondents further gave details of the terminal benefits and incidental expenses which were due to Mr. Mwangi amounting to Sh. 54,336/65 and how they were dispersed.

The Respondents did not call any witnesses but argued that in view of Mr. Mwangi's repeated disobedience of instructions they were fully justified in terminating his services and they were not prepared either to reinstate him or to pay him anything else. They asked the Court to reject the Claimants' demand.

It has become apparent to the Court that the relationship between Mr. Mwangi and the Respondents started deteriorating while he was at Kitui working as the Manager of the Respondents' Kitui branch. He was, however, on probation during this time. Mr. Mwangi was in Kitui for one year and three months and out of this period of 15 months he was on leave for five months in 1977 from January.

One allegation that figured prominently against him while at Kitui was that he had been using the guest house cutlery and had also allowed the guest house to deteriorate to a filthy condition. Mr. Mwangi told the Court that when he was transferred to Kitui he found that the previous manager had been using the guest house cutlery and he also continued doing the same. There is, however, a letter from the Respondents to Mr. Mwangi dated 10th July, 1976, in which he had been instructed to return the guest house things and it appears that Mr. Mwangi did not comply with these instructions. On 30th August, 1976, the Staff Manager wrote to him pointing out that he was still continuing to use the kitchen and household equipment supplied for the guest house and in the last paragraph of that letter it is written:—

“It would appear that of late your general attitude leaves much to be desired, particularly in relation to your senior officers and should we have any further cause for complaint the matter will be viewed most seriously.”

The use of cutlery and letting the guest house get dirty are not really very serious matters as far as Mr. Mwangi's performance as a Manager of a bank branch is concerned except that it shows somewhat that he was showing little respect for orders from the head office.

There is no doubt that the Respondents also felt the same that whilst they did not have any criticism of his work they felt

that his general attitude left something to be desired. The Respondents considered that he was resentful of authority and warned Mr. Mwangi that unless he curbed this trait it was doubtful that he would advance any further in their service. This they conveyed to him on 23rd December, 1976, and in the last paragraph of this letter they wrote:—

“In order to bring home to you the gravity of the situation your probationary period is hereby extended for a period of approximately three months after completion of your leave, i.e. until 3rd September, 1977.”

The Court has carefully considered the Claimants' submission on this particular point but finds that the Respondents were entitled to adopt the course of action which they did.

The serious complaints against Mr. Mwangi, however, seem to have risen when he came back from leave in June, 1977, and which are related to the Banker's Order of one Mr. Said Salim Mwangi and the others regarding the way he was running the branch. The latter allegations were mainly as a result of the Area Manager's routine visits to the branch.

On 19th June, 1977, it is alleged that the Assistant Area Manager visited the Kitui branch and found nobody there in the afternoon. Mr. Mwangi explained that as the Area Manager's visit was unannounced he had already arranged with the staff that they would be allowed to go home that afternoon. The Court, while appreciating what Mr. Mwangi stated in this respect, must state that the Manager of a branch is expected to fully co-operate with senior officers when they come on their unannounced visits for spot checks. But then this incident by itself is not serious enough to warrant any drastic action against Mr. Mwangi, otherwise the Respondents would have terminated his services at that time.

Regarding the allegations against Mr. Mwangi on the banker's order of S. S. Mwangi the Court finds that if what the Respondents allege against him is true then that in itself would have entitled them to summarily dismiss him at that time, i.e. in September, 1977. The Respondents, however, did not do so and from the lack of evidence before the Court due to the Respondent's failure to call any witnesses on the very serious allegations against Mr. Mwangi the Court must find them unproved. The Respondents have tried to implicate Mr. Mwangi through copy letters written by B. K. Mwillo and A. W. Kithikii which appear in their appendices 11 and 12 but the Court is not prepared to act on such inadequate and doubtful evidence of people who confess to have conspired with Mr. Mwangi in a criminal offence.

Mr. Mwillo wrote as follows regarding this banker's order:—

“The banker's order in question was brought to me for verifying the signature by Mr. Mwangi about two weeks ago. He was holding on to the signature of the customer and when I glanced at once to the signature which was of an old account holder I recognized it and initialled in the appropriate box in the stamp impression.”

A. W. Kithikii wrote as follows:—

“I regret and sincerely apologize for the part I played in the affair of altering the document. I did this under the influence of fear due to threat and attitude of approach by my senior officer it was unwise for me to be used ridiculously but realized his aims and intents very late.

Since employed I have kept my records faithful to the bank as my employer but I fear that they might have been stained by the consequences of this offence which I swear I had no criminal intent as I was put in it unknowingly.”

As stated earlier the Court has no alternative but to reject these allegations for not having been proved by the Respondents.

The Court would now like to refer to the Chief Inspector's report to the Senior Executive Director regarding the former's visit to Kitui on 7th September, 1977. The Respondents reproduced the report dated 9th September, 1977, in their appendix 16 which was marked strictly private and confidential. Mr. Mwangi denied any knowledge of having seen this report and on the contrary produced a copy of a report which the Chief Inspector had forwarded to the Manager Administration and Finance on 8th September, 1977. The Court is not prepared to act on a document which was a private memo between the Chief Inspector and the Senior Executive Director in the absence of the former having been called to give evidence on oath in order to be cross examined by the Claimants.

Mr. Mwangi was asked to answer certain questions which he did although the Respondents thought his answers to be unsatisfactory.

On 20th September, 1977, Mr. Mwangi was informed that one Mr. J. M. Kioko would take over the control of the Kitui branch with immediate effect and Mr. Mwangi was asked to

report to the head office on 29th September for interview. On 29th September, 1977, he was served with the following letter:—

"We refer to our letter of 23rd December, 1976, advising you of the extension of your probation and now advise that we are unable to confirm you in an appointment of M.G. 7.

In the circumstances you will revert to M.G. 8 and your salary will be paid at your substantive rank of Sh. 84,864 p.a. with effect from today.

We take this further opportunity to remind you that unless a marked improvement in your conduct is evident we shall be forced to give serious consideration to the question of your continuation in our service at the rank of M.G. 8."

The Court would now like to deal with the final stage of Mr. Mwangi's employment with the Respondents when he was transferred to their Mombasa branch on 30th September, 1977. Mr. Mwangi stated on oath that when he reported on duty at Mombasa he was given no formal post and he was being frustrated there. He said this continued until sometime in February, 1978, when he was asked to go and run the Respondents' Makupa Agency at Mombasa. The Respondents refuted this allegation but unfortunately for them they could not call any witness to testify that Mr. Mwangi was given certain duties on being transferred to the Mombasa Branch. So the Court is left with no alternative but to accept as true what Mr. Mwangi stated during evidence.

On 21st February, 1978, the Respondents wrote a letter to Mr. Mwangi in which they alleged that he had displayed reluctance to go to Makupa Agency and had uttered derogatory words which were not expected from officer of his rank. It was also written in this letter that he was transferred to Mombasa on disciplinary grounds and also to enable him to rehabilitate himself as his performance as Branch Manager at Kitui left much to be desired. The Court must point out that there is no evidence whatsoever prior to this letter that Mr. Mwangi was being disciplined and rehabilitated by being transferred to Mombasa.

Thereafter Mr. Mwangi was served with further letters impressing upon him that he was being sent to assume the control of Makupa Agency in order to give him an opportunity of serving the Agency to prove himself capable in this smaller unit as part of his rehabilitation.

Mr. Mwangi replied to these letters by requesting an assignment with any relevant managerial duties which conformed to his grade.

Mr. Mwangi while giving evidence stated that as a clerk during his service with the Respondents he used to control agencies and therefore felt that his transfer to Makupa Agency was most unfair and was intended to completely frustrate him in his employment.

Mr. Mwangi was served with a final letter of instructions to assume the post of officer-in-charge of Makupa Agency on 22nd March, 1978, but he again referred the Respondents to his previous reply and his services were then terminated on 30th March, 1978.

The Court has to determine if in the aforesaid circumstances Mr. Mwangi's repeated disobedience of instructions at the Treasury Square branch, Mombasa, justified the Respondents in terminating his employment.

The Court while appreciating the Respondents' submission that Mr. Mwangi's services were not terminated for irregularities committed at Kitui branch must point out that according to the Respondents themselves they had transferred Mr. Mwangi to Mombasa in order to discipline and rehabilitate him. So these alleged irregularities do have an important bearing on this dispute. The Court has already commented on this aspect of the dispute in detail and has come to the conclusion that the Respondents failed to prove the most serious irregularities alleged to have been committed by Mr. Mwangi. In fact they did not even tell Mr. Mwangi at any stage until sometime in February, 1978, that he had been transferred to Mombasa on disciplinary grounds and for rehabilitation.

The allegation against Mr. Mwangi of refusing to return guest house cutlery is there but the Court does not find that to be serious enough to warrant any disciplinary action against him. The Court has carefully gone through the relevant documents that were produced by the Claimants and which were not challenged by the Respondents and has come to the same conclusion as the Respondents themselves came to in or about August, 1977, that Mr. Mwangi had been put in a difficult position on the complaint of Said Salim Mwangi. Mr. Mwangi in his evidence had clearly stated that the matter of S. S. Mwangi had started in 1974 when the present Staff Manager was the Manager at Kitui branch. S. S. Mwangi had ordered certain goods from African Retail Traders which were received by

the bank on 3rd November, 1974 and were released to the customer but African Retail Traders were not paid for the cost of these goods. Mr. Mwangi added that this company claimed payment in July, 1977, soon after he had resumed duties in June and his branch therefore debited S. S. Mwangi's account by Sh. 13,663 and paid it to African Retail Traders.

Mr. Mwangi's above statement seems to have been corroborated by a letter which the Respondents' Manager Administration and Finance wrote to Mr. Ndeto Mututo, advocate, Kitui, on 24th August, 1977. In this letter it is written as follows:—

"We refer to your letter of 19th August last which we regret that we do not understand.

We cannot see that there is anything to be settled in or out of court. Mr. Mwangi had goods delivered to him on 3rd November, 1974, for which he has ultimately had to make payment.

Is he denying receipt of the 37 cartons of goods?"

The Court has also carefully considered the matter of the deductions on behalf of the income tax from the account of S. S. Mwangi and here again the Court is constrained to give the benefit of doubt to Mr. Mwangi.

After careful consideration of all the submissions the Court finds that problems did arise at Kitui during the time when Mr. Mwangi was the Manager but neither the Respondents, otherwise they would have terminated his services at that time, nor the Court can hold Mr. Mwangi responsible directly for these problems. The Court is satisfied that it is for this reason that the Respondents decided first to extend his probation as a Manager and then not to confirm him in that grade and transferred him to Mombasa.

With this background the Court has come to the conclusion that the Respondents' action in ordering a person in the substantive rank of M.G. 8 earning a salary of Sh. 84,864 p.a. to go and assume the control of an Agency to be most unreasonable and was indeed intended to force him to resign. The Court is very mindful of the fact that employees should not disobey lawful orders but at the same time the employers cannot escape their obligations in this regard to ensure that such orders are reasonable and consistent with the duties which go with the respective grades of their employees. The Court finds that Mr. Mwangi's reply asking to be assigned duties which were relevant to his grade was not an unreasonable request in the face of a transfer which was intended to demoralize him rather than rehabilitate him.

After careful consideration of all the submissions the Court has come to the conclusion that Mr. Mwangi has suffered a wrongful dismissal but the Court is not inclined to either award his reinstatement or heavy compensation as demanded by the Claimants.

The Court finds that Mr. Mwangi was not confirmed in Grade 7 and it was the Respondents' prerogative which they exercised against him, and the Court may add, with some justification. So his salary at the time of termination of his services was Sh. 84,864 p.a. The Respondents have already given him credit for one months salary in lieu of notice amounting to Sh. 7,257/50. The Court is not concerned with the deductions due to income tax from Mr. Mwangi because if the Claimants' allegations that Mr. Mwangi did not owe the income tax the amount was deducted by the Respondents from the amount which was due to him then the Claimants should ask for a refund from the Income Tax Department.

In assessing the compensation that Mr. Mwangi should get for the wrongful dismissal that he has suffered, the Court has taken into consideration all the circumstances relevant to this dispute. The Court has decided that Mr. Mwangi should get an additional three months' salary amounting to Sh. 21,772/50 by way of compensation for the wrongful dismissal that he has suffered. This amount should be in addition to the terminal benefits and incidental expenses that the Respondents worked out in their appendix 32.

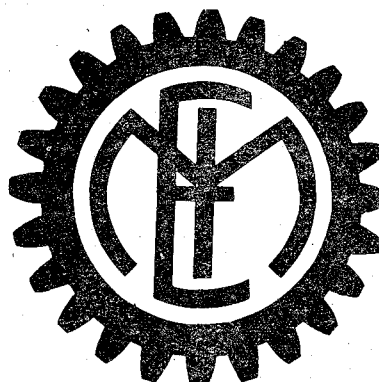

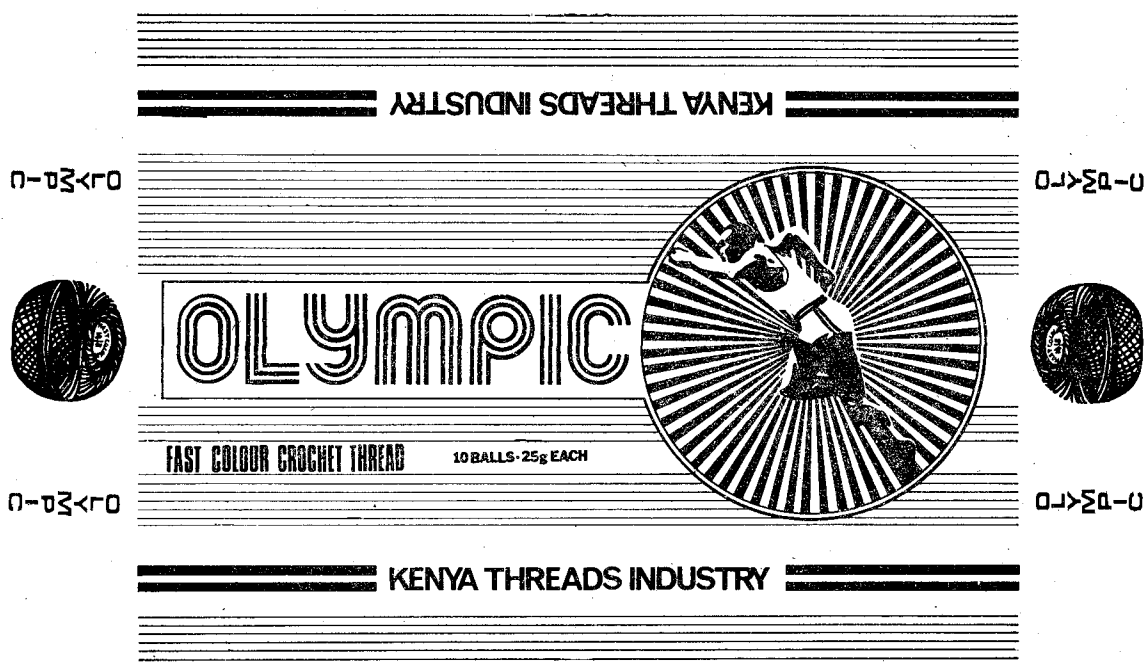

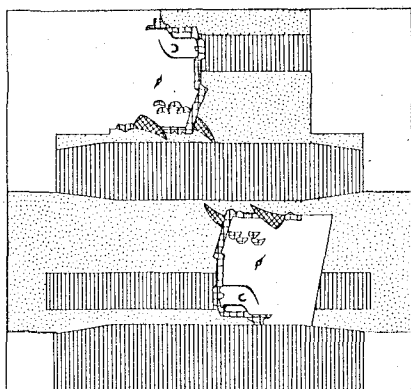
