KAPSAUS CENTRE—PLOTS FOR SHOPS, OFFICES AND FLATS
(EXCLUDING SALE OF PETROL)

THE Commissioner of Lands, on behalf of the County Council of Kipsigis gives notice that the plots in Wapsaus Centre as described in the Schedule hereto are available for alienation and applications are invited for the direct grants of the individual plots.

2. A plan of the plots may be seen at the Public Map Office situated in the Lands Department Building, City Square, Nairobi, or at the office of the District Commissioner, Kericho or may be obtained from the Public Map Office, P.O. Box 30089, Nairobi, on payment of K.Sh. 10 post free.

3. Applications should be submitted to the Commissioner of Lands, Nairobi, through the District Commissioner, Kericho stating the plots required in order of preference. Applications must be on prescribed forms which are available from Lands Department or the District Commissioner, Kericho.

4. Applications must be sent so as to reach the District Commissioner not later than noon on 6th August, 1979.

5. Application must not be sent direct to the Commissioner of Lands.

6. Applicants must enclose with their applications their money orders or postal orders or cash for K.Sh. 1,000 as a deposit, which will be dealt with as follows:—

(a) If the applicant is offered and takes up and pays for a plot within a period of seven days as required in paragraph 5 below, the deposit will be credited to him.

(b) If the application is unsuccessful the applicant's deposit will be returned to him.

(c) If the application is successful and the applicant fails to take up and pay for the plot offered to him within a period of 14 days as required in paragraph 5 below of the General Conditions, the Commissioner of Lands may declare the deposit forfeited and the applicant shall have no further claim thereto.

7. Each application should be accompanied by a statement indicating:—

(a) The amount of capital it is proposed to spend on the project.

(b) The amount of actual capital available for development with a banker's letter or other evidence of financial status in support.

(c) The manner in which it is proposed to raise the balance of the capital required for the development, if any.

(d) Each applicant to insert his/her new identity card number under the Registration of Persons Act. If it is a company, the names of directors and citizenship to be indicated.

(e) Full details of both residential and/or commercial properties owned by the applicant in the Republic.

General Conditions

1. The ordinary conditions applicable to township grants of this nature except as varied hereby shall apply to this grant.

2. The title will be made under the provisions of the Trust Lands Act (Cap. 288 of the Laws of Kenya).

3. The grant will be issued in the name of the allottee as stated in the letters of application.

4. The term of the grant will be for 33 years from the first day of the month following the notification of the approval of the grant.

5. Each allottee of a plot shall pay to the Commissioner of Lands within 14 days of notification that his application has been approved, the initial estimated amount for the construction of roads and drains to serve the plot, the assessed stand premium and proportion of annual rent, together with the survey fees payable in respect of the preparation and registration of the Title (K.Sh. 400) and the stamp duty in respect of the grant (approximately 2 per cent of the stand premium) and annual rent. In default of payment within the specified time, the Commissioner of Lands may cancel the allocation and the applicant shall have no further claim to the grant of the plot.

Special Conditions

1. No building shall be erected on the land nor shall additions or external alterations be made to any buildings otherwise than

in conformity with plans and specifications previously approved in writing by the Commissioner of Lands and the Local Authority. The Commissioner shall not give his approval unless he is satisfied that the proposals are such as to develop the land adequately and satisfactorily.

2. The lessee shall within six months of the commencement of the term submit in triplicate to the Local Authority and the Commissioner of Lands plans (including block plans showing the positions of the buildings and a system of drainage for the disposal of sewage, surface and sullage water), drawings, elevations and specifications of the buildings the grantee proposes to erect on the land and shall within 24 months of the actual registration of the title complete the erection of such buildings and the construction of the drainage system in conformity with such plans, elevations and specifications as amended (if such be the case) by the Commissioner:

Provided that notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in or implied by the Trust Lands Act (Cap 288), if default shall be made in the performance or observance of any of the requirements of this condition it shall be lawful by him on behalf of the County Council to re-enter into and upon the land or any part thereof in the name of the whole and there-upon the term hereby created shall cease but without prejudice to any right of action or remedy of the County Council in respect of any antecedent breach of any condition herein contained.

3. The lessee shall maintain in good and substantial repair and condition all buildings at any time erected on the land.

4. Should the grantee give notice in writing to the County Council that he is unable to complete the buildings within the period aforesaid, the Commissioner of Lands shall (at the grantee's expense) accept a surrender of the land comprised herein:

Provided further that in such notice as aforesaid shall be given—

(1) within 12 months of the actual registration of the title, the County Council shall refund to the grantee 50 per centum of the stand premium paid in respect of the land, or

(2) at any subsequent time prior to expiration of the said building period, the County Council shall refund to the grantee 25 per centum of the said stand premium. In the event of notice being given after the expiration of the said building period, no refund shall be made.

5. The land and buildings shall only be used for shops (excluding a petrol station), office and flats.

6. The buildings shall not cover more than 75 per centum of the area of the land if used for shop and/or office purposes only or such lesser area as may be laid down by the Local Authority in its by-laws, and not more than 50 per centum of the area of the land if used for the combined purposes of shops, offices and flats or such lesser area as may be laid down by the Local Authority in its by-laws.

7. The land shall not be used for the purposes of any trade or business which the Commissioner of Lands considers to be dangerous or offensive.

8. The lessee shall not subdivide the land.

9. The lessee shall not sell, transfer, sublet, charge or part with the possession of the land or any part thereof except with the prior consent in writing of the Commissioner of Lands: no application for such consent (except in respect of a loan required for building purposes) will be considered until Special Condition No. 2 has been performed:

Provided that such consent shall not be required for the letting of individual shops, offices and flats.

10. The lessee shall pay to the Local Authority on demand such sum as the Local Authority estimate to be the proportionate cost of construction and the ascertainment of the actual proportionate cost either pay (within seven days of demand) or be refunded the amount by which the actual proportionate cost exceeds or falls short of the amount paid as aforesaid.

11. The lessee shall from time to time pay to the Local Authority of lands on demand such proportion of the cost of maintaining all roads and drains serving or adjoining the land as the Local Authority may assess.

12. Should the Local Authority at any time require the said roads to be constructed to a higher standard the grantee shall pay to the Commissioner on demand such proportion of the cost of such construction as the Local Authority may assess.

13. The lessee shall pay such rates, taxes, charges, duties, assessments or outgoings of whatever description as may be imposed, charged or assessed by any Government or Local

Authority upon the land or the buildings erected thereon, including any contribution or other sum paid by the President in lieu thereof.

14. The County Council or such person or authority as may be appointed for the purpose shall have the right to enter upon the land and lay and have access to water mains of all descriptions, whether overhead or underground, and the grantee shall not erect any building in such a way as to cover or interfere with any existing alignments of main or service pipes or telephone or telegraph wires and electric mains.

Issues in dispute:—

1. Wages and wage increase.
2. Protective clothing.
3. Leave travelling allowance.
4. Casual employment.
5. Effective date and duration.

1. The Kenya Timber and Furniture Workers' Union shall hereinafter be referred to as the Claimants and G.D. & Brothers shall hereinafter be referred to as the Respondents.

2. The parties were heard in Nairobi on the 20th day of April, 1979 and relied on their written and verbal submissions.

AWARD

3. The Notification of Dispute Form "A" dated 9th November, 1978 duly signed by the parties was received by the Court on 25th January, 1979 together with the statutory certificate signed by the Labour Commissioner.

The formal relationship between the parties was established on 17th January, 1978 when a recognition agreement was signed although the Claimants maintain that informal recognition had existed for more than 10 years.

The present dispute stems from the Claimants' efforts to negotiate a collective agreement on behalf of the Respondents' employees who are unionizable. In this connexion on 6th May, 1977 they forwarded to the Respondents the collective agreement which they had signed with the Timber Industry Employers' Association (Rural Section) which was effective from 1st April, 1976 for a period of two years and which gave the workers employed in the timber industry in the rural section wage increase of 15 per cent and 12 per cent each year. The Claimants said that this was forwarded to the Respondents at the latter's request. The Respondents, however, refused to implement this agreement.

The Claimants submitted their proposals to the Respondents for a collective agreement on 4th April, 1978 and they pointed out that it was exactly two years from 1st April, 1976 when the Respondents' employees were expecting to get wage increases.

The parties carried out negotiations and eventually reached a stage where the Respondents offered 10 per cent increase for the first year and another 10 per cent for the second year with effect from 1st July, 1978 for those who did not get wage increase in January 1978. For those who received wage increase in January 1978 they offered 10 per cent with effect from January 1979 and another 10 per cent in January 1980. The Claimants, however, proposed 17 per cent for the first year and a further 17 per cent for the second year with effect from 1st January 1978 as a compromise. The Respondents could not accept this.

Conciliation efforts by the Ministry of Labour failed to resolve the dispute on the aforesaid issues and the matter is now before the Court.

At the Court's request detailed investigation was carried out by the Employment Promotion Division of the Ministry of Labour and the Court and the parties had before it a detailed analysis of the claim and the points involved therein before it during the hearing.

The Court finds that the Claimants' demand of 42.3 per cent or 21.2 per cent per year is clearly above acceptable percentage wage increase under the Guidelines while on the other hand the Respondents' offer of wage increase of 10 per cent per year with effect from 1st January, 1979 would undercompensate the workers.

The Court before going into the other demands would first of all like to determine the effective date and duration of the collective agreement so that the percentage wage increase as due to the workers under the Guidelines can then be worked out.

The Court is satisfied on the report of the E.P.D. that the Respondents did annually increase the salaries of their workers in 1977, 1978 and 1979 by a minimum of 10 per cent and that some workers got more. The Court also notes that the Respondents have already complied with the Presidential Directive of 12th December, 1978 to increase employment level by 10 per cent not later than April 1979.

After careful consideration of all the submissions the Court has decided to award the effective date to be 1st January, 1979 for the collective agreement with a duration period of two years from that date.

The Respondents have resisted the Claimants' salary demand mainly on the ground that they are hard pressed due to non-possession of Forest concession permit from the Government which if granted would lower their transportation costs and logging prices and in turn would increase the profit margin. The Respondents were forced to search for logs on farms and they had as a result to incur heavy transportation costs. This renders their labour idle while they are waiting for the logs to arrive at their saw mill. The Respondents added that they had reduced their lorries from 20 in 1975 to 10 in 1979 due to declining business in saw milling. The E.P.D. report confirms these statements and points out that the Respondents' work force had declined from 103 in 1967 to 68 in 1978.

As stated above the Court has ruled that the effective date of the agreement should be 1st January, 1979. The Court has accordingly worked out the workers' entitlement under the Guidelines taking into account the date when the wages were last revised for the purpose of this dispute to be 1st April, 1976. The increase in the cost of living from April 1976 to January 1979 is 42.3 per cent under the Guidelines the workers are entitled to 12.5 per cent per year.

The Respondents have already awarded the workers a 10 per cent wage increase with effect from 1st January, 1979.

The Court has taken into consideration the protracted negotiations that preceded the dispute before it came to the Court and the fact that the workers did not get their full increase due to them with effect from 1st April, 1976.

After careful consideration of all the submissions and taking into account the Guidelines which have been issued to the Court by the Vice-President and the Minister for Finance the Court makes the following award on the issues in dispute:

Wages and wage increase

The Court awards that all unionizable employees of the Respondents should get a wage increase of 4 per cent with effect from 1st January, 1979 and that this increase should be in addition to the 10 per cent increase which has already been awarded by the Respondents to them.

The Court further awards that all the unionizable employees working for the Respondents should get a further wage increase of 12.5 per cent with effect from 1st January, 1980.

Protective clothing

The Court awards that the following categories of employees should be provided with protective clothing indicated as below:

- (a) Overcoats: Watchmen.
 (b) Overalls: i. Saw Doctor and Assistants.
 ii. Mechanics.
 iii. Assistant Mechanics.
 (c) Aprons: i. Sawyers.
 ii. Planning / Moulding Machine Operators.
 iii. Assistant Planning / Moulding Machine Operators
 iv. Cross Cutters.
 v. Sawyers Assistants.
 (d) Cloth Caps (Khaki) Saw Dust Carriers.

Leave travelling allowance

The Court finds that the Claimants' demand of K.Sh. 300 under this item is far in excess of the permissible limits under the Guidelines. The Court, however, has come to the conclusion that workers should get a leave travelling allowance and the Court awards that the workers should be paid a leave travelling allowance of K.Sh. 30 when they proceed on annual leave.

Casual employment

The Court having taken into account the special circumstances under which the Respondents operate in that they have to seek timber from various farms all over the country which forces them to employ labour from those places the Court has decided to make no award on this issue.

Effective date and duration

The Court awards that the effective date should be 1st January, 1979 with a duration period of two years from that date.

Parties:—

Domestic and Hotel Workers' Union
and

Mandera Secondary School

Issue in dispute:—

Dismissal of Mr. Madobe Boshe Isaak.

1. The Domestic and Hotel Workers' Union shall hereinafter be referred to as the Claimants and Mandera Secondary School shall hereinafter be referred to as the Respondents.

2. The parties were heard in Nairobi, on the 25th day of April, 1979, and relied on their written and verbal submissions.

AWARD

3. The Notification of Dispute Form "A" dated 9th May, 1978, duly signed by the parties was received by the Court on 4th December together with the statutory certificates signed by the Minister for Labour and the Labour Commissioner.

Mr. Madobe Boshe Isaak was employed by the Respondents as a Driver Grade 3, on 1st June, 1974. He was suspended on 12th July, 1975. The reason for suspension from duty was that he had allowed the official vehicle which was under his charge to be driven by a third person when he, Mr. Isaak, was not even seated in it. This was considered a serious offence quite contrary to the rules and regulations in operation for Government vehicles. He was advised that his case would come up before the next meeting of the Board of Governors.

Mr. Isaak replied to his letter in which he made counter allegations against the Headmaster.

On 29th July, 1975, the Provincial Education Officer, North-Eastern Province, wrote to Mr. Isaak after he had received a copy of the letter which Mr. Isaak had written to the Secretary of the Respondents' Board of Governors. The Provincial Education Officer pointed out to Mr. Isaak that his letter showed that he did not respect the Headmaster who was his immediate superior. He wrote as follows:—

"The theme of the letter reveals that you are not in any way respecting the Headmaster who is your immediate superior. You were suspended because you gave the school vehicles to somebody else to drive, contrary to the rules and regulations laid down for vehicles of Government statutory institutions. This in itself is serious enough to have you dismissed from the service of the Board of Governors."

The second page of your letter is abusive and lacking respect for your superior, and I do not believe that your allegations are true. You are cooking a false story against your superior, and it cannot be accepted.

You will recall that you have been warned against your rude behaviour several times even long before the present Headmaster took over the school. You were also warned by the school Board of Governors on 16th July, 1974, but you do not seem to care at all.

In view of the foregoing I feel that your behaviour cannot be tolerated any longer and by copy of this letter I am asking the Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Education to consider your dismissal from service."

Mr. Isaak replied to the above letter denying the allegations made against him and stating that what he had stated in his letter was true.

On 3rd December, 1975, he was dismissed with immediate effect. He was told to report to the School and collect his half salary for November, 1975, and the sum for 1st to 3rd December, 1975.

The Respondent during the hearing told the Court that Mr. Isaak had joined the Claimants in November, 1975, which statement was not denied by the Claimants.

The Claimants having reported a trade dispute to the Minister for Labour on this issue, an investigation was carried out by the Ministry. On 15th March, 1978, the Permanent Secretary forwarded a very detailed investigation report containing the parties' submissions and the investigator's findings and recommendation to the parties.

The recommendation was that the dismissal be reduced to normal termination of service and that Mr. Isaak be paid full wages for the time he was under suspension. It was also recommended that he be paid in lieu of his terminal notice which he would have been entitled to in accordance with the collective agreement.

The Claimants rejected these findings and the dispute is now before the Court.

The Claimants' main argument during the hearing were that Mr. Isaak had never been issued with three written warning letter in accordance with their collective agreement and that he was not summoned to the Board of Governors' meeting of 3rd December, 1975, in order to defend himself.

The Claimants also argued that the Headmaster himself had misused the school vehicle and that Mr. Isaak had clashed with the Headmaster on account of this and they denied that Mr. Isaak had committed any kinds of insubordination to the Headmaster by giving a detailed reply when he was suspended. They asked for his reinstatement with full salary for the intervening period.

The Respondents referred to certain incidents during the time Mr. Isaak was employed by them as a driver to show that his general performance of duties was below standard and that he had repeatedly neglected instructions pertaining to his duties.

The Court finds that the Headmaster and Mr. Isaak did not get along well as is quite obvious from the allegations which they have repeatedly made against each other both outside and in the Court. In the absence of any evidence on oath by either party the Court has to rely on the documentary evidence produced before it. The Court finds that the Provincial Education Officer's letter dated 29th July, 1975, to be an independent piece of evidence in this dispute. The Provincial Education Officer pointed out to Mr. Isaak on 29th July, 1975, as stated hereinabove that Mr. Isaak had been warned about his rude behaviour several times even long before the present Headmaster took over the School. The Provincial Education Officer added that he was also warned by the School Board of Governors on 16th July, 1974, and Mr. Isaak had not cared at all about these warnings.

The Court has very carefully gone through the findings of the Ministry of Labour Investigator which, as the Court has pointed out, are very detailed indeed, and the Court after having heard the parties' verbal submissions can see no reason to overrule the findings and recommendation of the Ministry.

The Court has carefully considered all aspects of this dispute and has decided to uphold the recommendation of the Ministry of Labour and the Court accordingly awards that Mr. Isaak should be paid full salary for the time he was under suspension, i.e. from 12th July, 1975, until the end of December, 1975. The Court further awards that his terminal notice should take effect from 1st January, 1976, and he should accordingly be paid a month's salary from that date.

Parties:—

Kenya Local Government Workers' Union
and
Nairobi City Council

Issue in dispute:—

Refusal by the Council to pay acting allowance to A. Oballah.

1. The Kenya Local Government Workers' Union shall hereinafter be referred to as the Claimants and Nairobi City Council shall hereinafter be referred to as the Respondents.

2. The parties were heard in Nairobi on 18th and 19th April, 1979 and relied on their written and verbal submissions.

AWARD

3. The Notification of Dispute Form "A" dated 5th October, 1978 duly signed by the parties was received by the Court on 19th December together with the statutory certificate signed by the Labour Commissioner.

This dispute involves a rather small amount of K.Sh. 314 which the Claimants are claiming on behalf of their member, Mr. Oballah by way of acting allowance. The Respondents told the Court that they were resisting this claim on a matter of principle.

The facts are that the Stores Superintendent appointed Mr. Oballah to act as Wines and Spirits Storekeeper in Scale J for 32 days on 18th November, 1976. The acting appointment was to run from 22nd November to 31st December, 1976. The copies of this letter were sent to the City Treasurer and his Deputy. On 25th January, 1977 the Deputy City Treasurer wrote back to the Stores Superintendent in the following terms:

"Referring to your memo to me Ref. SS/WK/CT/274/76 in connexion with payment of acting allowance to Mr. Oballah during the time Mr. Ndegwa was on leave please note that this was prohibited by Minute No. 1 (iii) of the Special Finance Committee held on 27th April, 1976. Please inform Mr. Oballah accordingly."

The Claimants processed this dispute at the Joint Staff Committee and having failed to settle it they reported the dispute to the Minister for Labour.

The Claimants' main argument is that the Stores Superintendent was recognized by the Respondents as the section head and his action in recommending Mr. Oballah to act should have been honoured by them as they had done on a previous occasion in 1970. They maintained that this time again the Store Superintendent did the same and it was most unfortunate that the Respondents rejected this acting appointment well after the period during which Mr. Oballah had acted as Wines and Spirits Storekeeper.

The Claimants rejected the Respondents' argument that acting allowances had been prohibited in April, 1976 on the ground that many payments for acting allowances had been made since the alleged prohibition. The Claimants produced documents which the Court must note were not challenged by the Respondents to prove this point.

The Respondents maintained that it was only the Establishment Committee that had the power to appoint officers for acting appointments. The Respondents further pointed out that because of the anticipated deficit of £169,318 the Finance Committee at its meeting held on 27th April, 1976 had resolved:

"That the recommendations of the Chief Officers as contained in paragraph A, namely, that all filling of vacancies be frozen as soon as these minutes are ratified by the Council later this afternoon, except those specifically detailed in the said paragraph, be approved with immediate effect, and further all locum appointments, internal promotions, acting appointments, regradings be suspended forthwith, and overtime be drastically restricted forthwith."

The above resolution was adopted by the Council at its monthly meeting of 4th May, 1976.

The Respondents submitted that Mr. Oballah was never appointed to act in a higher grade in terms of the parties' own acting appointment provision and in any case the acting appointments had been suspended as one of the many economic measures instituted by them because of the aforesaid deficit which they faced.

The Court has taken a grave view of the admission made by the Respondents' spokesman that certain malpractices did take place at the City Hall and the Court has no doubt that it is as a result of this that the Finance Committee's resolution as adopted by the Council had been flouted on a number of occasions. The Court hopes that the authorities concerned will take due note of this.

As far as the Court is concerned it cannot give its blessings to an arrangement which is quite contrary to the parties' own collective agreement and is in violation of the Respondents' own resolutions as quoted hereinabove. The relevant clause on acting allowance states:

(a) An officer shall be entitled to be paid an acting allowance if he is temporarily appointed by the Establishment Committee to act for a period of at least one month in salary A to N.

(b) An acting allowance shall be half the difference between the minimum of the officer's substantive salary scale and the minimum salary scale appropriate to the post in which he acts."

It is quite clear from the above that an officer shall be entitled to be paid acting allowance if he is appointed by the Establishment Committee and if in the past the parties have indulged in a practice which is outside the terms and conditions which they themselves have agreed they cannot expect the Court to be a party to such a practice. In this dispute the Respondents have pleaded that the Establishment Committee did not make an acting appointment of Mr. Oballah and the Court finds that that is so. The Court cannot accept the Claimants' submission that the head of the department makes an acting appointment which is later approved and confirmed by the Establishment Committee. Even if that is the procedure the Establishment Committee have to approve and confirm such an acting appointment which in this case they have not done.

The Court while seriously hoping that the authorities will take note of the malpractices which have occurred at the City Hall as conceded by their spokesman has no alternative but to reject the Claimants' demand on behalf of Mr. Oballah.

After careful consideration of all the submissions the Court finds that Mr. Oballah is not entitled to the acting allowance as claimed on his behalf.

Failure by the Council to pay overtime to staff in the Social Welfare Section of Social Services and Housing Department.

1. The Kenya Local Government Workers' Union shall hereinafter be referred to as Claimants and the Nairobi City Council shall hereinafter be referred to as the Respondents.

2. The parties were heard in Nairobi on the 19th day of April, 1979 and relied on their written and verbal submissions.

AWARD

3. The Notification of Dispute Form "A" dated 5th October, 1978 duly signed by the parties was received by the Court on 19th December together with the statutory certificate signed by the Labour Commissioner.

The Claimants are claiming a sum of K.Sh. 32,877/90 which they allege is the overtime due to their 20 members working for the Respondents in the Social Welfare Section. The details of this claim appear on page 2 of their written submission and represents a claim for overtime worked for 4,427 hours by all these 20 employees.

There is no dispute that this overtime claim is due to the 20 persons involved and the Respondents concede this point.

This claim is linked with the working hours for all the Respondents' employees as decided way back in 1956 as follows:

"Monday to Friday inclusive
8.15 a.m. to 12.45 p.m.
and
2.00 p.m. to 4.30 p.m.
Saturdays
8.15 a.m. to 12.15 p.m."

In 1970 between January and December these 20 employees worked the aforesaid overtime and by 1973 despite the claim having been forwarded on their behalf it had not been settled. The Claimants gave details of the representations made by their officials in this respect and also referred to a letter dated 4th October 1973 which the Respondents' Director of Social Services and Housing had written to the City Treasurer with copy to the Town Clerk as follows:

"Overtime Payment for the year 1970—Welfare Section:

We have discussed and talked about the above subject since 1971. I am now forwarding herewith Xerox copy of a memo dated 17th September, 1973 I have received from the Departmental Shopsteward for favour of your consideration and action.

These overtime claims were authorized by this Department."

The last sentence of the above letter is in conformity with rule 17 of the Terms and Conditions of Service For Salaried employees applicable to the Respondents' employees. This rule 17 reads as follows:

"Overtime:

- (a) Payment for overtime in accordance with arrangements approved by the Head of Department, after normal working hours for officers in salary scales F-N in Nairobi and I-N in Mombasa inclusive shall be paid overtime provided that such overtime has been specifically authorized in writing by the officer's Section Head.
- (b) Overtime shall be payable at the following rates calculated daily on a pro-rata basis:
 - i. In respect of weekdays at one and one quarter times the normal hourly rate;
 - ii. In respect of Sundays one and one half times the normal hourly rate;
 - iii. In respect of Public Holidays at twice the normal hourly rate."

This claim was discussed on 18th January, 1974 at a meeting of the Joint Staff Committee when it was deferred for the City Treasurer to investigate about the alleged claims for overtime payment already approved by the Director.

The City Treasurer after investigations reported on 15th November, 1974 and stated that these were not overtime claims as such but claims for the differences for the number of working hours applying to officers in the Welfare Section of the Social Services and Housing Department prior to 1970 and the reduced number of working hours resulting from an agreement with the Claimants effective from January 1970 but not implemented until the middle of 1970. Following this report the Staff Committee resolved:

- "i. To recommend that authority be given for the genuine overtime claims to be paid.
- ii. That any doubtful claims be referred to the director of Social Services and Housing."

Finally at a meeting of the Finance Committee held on 22nd October, 1975 following a report by the City Treasurer it was resolved:

"That authority be given for the settlement of claims for additional payment to members of the staff in the Welfare Section, Social Services and Housing Department amounting to K.Sh. 32,882/05 subject to receipt of a supplementary estimate."

The above resolution of the Finance Committee was adopted by a full Council Meeting at its monthly meeting on 4th November, 1975.

The Respondents find themselves in difficulty because the Minister for Local Government has not approved their request for a supplementary estimate of K.Sh. 32,882/05 to meet the above claim.

The Court has gone through the correspondence that was exchanged between the Respondents and the Permanent Secretary of Local Government, regarding the supplementary estimate to cover this particular expenditure.

The Court has considered this aspect of the dispute very carefully and concurs with the Claimants' submission that the information conveyed by the Respondents to the Minister for Local Government on this matter did not reflect the true position and that the Minister was not properly briefed on this claim. The Court is satisfied that the employees did know that they were working in excess of the agreed normal working hours and they expected payment of overtime for the extra hours worked. This is quite evident from the representations which were made by the Claimants' shopsteward in the Social Welfare Section in 1972 and 1973.

The Permanent Secretary on 18th August, 1976 wrote as follows to the City Treasurer on the supplementary estimate:

"You state that 'the employees in question did not know that they were working in excess of the agreed normal hours.' It appears rather odd that in the whole council the 20 employees in the Welfare Section were not aware of the new terms reducing working hours from 45 to 39 hours per week. The terms were negotiated by the Union and were given wide publicity. It seems that this could not have escaped the notice of the employees, their head of section and department. Please clarify."

It is quite clear from the above that had the Minister been briefed properly over this claim the result would have been quite different as far as his approval of supplementary estimate of K.Sh. 32,882/05 is concerned.

The Court like the Respondents themselves is satisfied that these workers are entitled to this payment of K.Sh. 32,882/05 and that this is a genuine claim.

The Court appreciate the difficult position in which the Respondents find themselves by virtue of regulations 212 and 214 of the Local Government Regulations 1963 under which no Local Authority shall incur any expenditure which is not included in the approved estimates of such Authority. The Court, however, as stated above, is satisfied that this is a genuine claim to which these 20 workers are entitled and that the Minister's decision would have been different if he had been properly briefed on this matter.

The Court has no alternative in this dispute but to make an award as demanded by the Claimants and the Court accordingly awards that the Respondents should pay the 20 employees concerned in this dispute the sum of K.Sh. 32,882/05 due to them in respect of the overtime claim. The Court feels confident that the Minister's approval will be forthcoming to enable the Respondents to meet this claim.

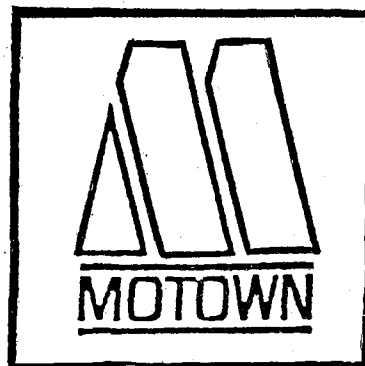

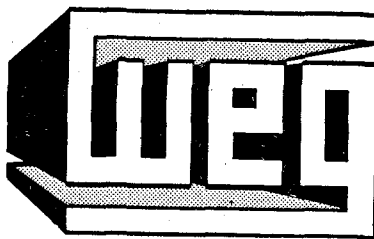

All "copy" submitted for publication should be prepared on one side of a foolscap sheet no matter how small the notice or Act, each page being numbered, and should be typewritten with double spacing. Copy should be clear, legible, and contain a minimum of alterations.

Particular attention should be paid to the following points:-

- (i) Signatures must be clarified by means of rubber-stamping or typing the name of the signer in capital letters.
- (ii) Dates must be correct and filled in where necessary.
- (iii) Care should be taken to ensure that all headings to notices and references to legislation are up to date and conform with the Revised Edition of the Laws of Kenya.

EXTRACT FROM THE CODE OF REGULATIONS, SECTION D—

Kenya Gazette

D.41. (1) Communications for the *Kenya Gazette* should reach the Government Printer not later than 12 noon, on Tuesday of the week that publication is desired. The Government Printer will not publish communications received after that hour until the next subsequent issue of the *Gazette*.

(2) It will facilitate work at the Press if Permanent Secretaries will forward *Gazette* notices to the Government Printer when ready.

It is emphasized that these notes are for guidance only, but it is requested that persons submitting copy for publication first satisfy themselves that such copy is complete in every respect.
