Whereas a trade dispute has arisen and now exists between the Nigerian Mining Employers' Association and their employees represented by the Nigerian African Mineworkers' Union, the Amalgamated Tin Mines of Nigeria African Workers' Union, and the Northern Mineworkers' Union:

AND WHEREAS the endeavours to promote a settlement by direct negotiation and by means of conciliation meetings conducted by the Department of Labour have proved unsuccessful:

AND WHEREAS the Nigerian Mining Employers' Association and their employees represented by the Nigerian African Mineworkers' Union, the Amalgamated Tin Mines of Nigeria African Workers' Union, and the Northern Mineworkers' Union have consented to refer the matters in dispute to an arbitration tribunal:

And whereas, in exercise of the powers conferred upon the Governor-General by section 4 of the Trades Disputes (Arbitration and Inquiry) Ordinance, Chapter 219 of the Laws of Nigeria and delegated to the Commissioner of Labour, the matters in dispute have been referred by the Commissioner of Labour to an arbitration tribunal, consisting of Professor John Henry Richardson to act as Arbitrator in the said dispute and Stephen Babalola Kuku, Esquire and Donald Stuart McKay, Esquire as Assessors to assist the said Arbitrator in examining the claims of the employees of the Nigerian Mining Employers' Association represented by the Nigerian African Mineworkers' Union, the Amalgamated Tin Mines of Nigeria African Workers' Union, and the Northern Mineworkers' Union in the terms of the Schedule as follows:—

MEETINGS OF THE TRIBUNAL

2. Tribunal assembled in Jos on 8th December, 1954 and concluded its proceedings on 13th December, 1954. The first meeting was held in the Library, Jos Museum on 9th December, 1954 at which the Tribunal's procedure was outlined and a provisional programme arranged. Public hearings were held at the same venue on 10th, 11th (two meetings) and 13th December, 1954. The Tribunal met in private on 12th December, 1954.

Visits were made to various types of working places to enable members of the Tribunal to observe the main kinds of mining operations and conditions of work. The places visited included workshops, a mineral dressing plant, and open cast workings operated by gravel pump and sluice box, by dragline and washing plant, by mechanical earth moving equipment and by hand.

REPRESENTATION

3. The Trade Unions were represented by Mr C. OKEI-ACHAMBA, General Secretary, A.T.M.N. African Workers' Union, Mr P. I. OKOYE, General Secretary, Nigerian African Mineworkers' Union and Mallam M. A. DANLADI, General Secretary, Northern Mineworkers' Union assisted by Mr C. A. J. NWAJEI, Counsel for the Unions and Mr E. A. COWAN, Economic Adviser.

The Nigerian Mining Employers Association was represented by Mr N. L. Carrick, Mr D. Hinton, Mr F. Pogson, Major J. L. Vittoria, and Mr E. Bathurst, assisted by Mr R. C. Rickett, Counsel for the Association.

THE CASE PRESENTED FOR THE EMPLOYEES

4. The case for the employees as presented by the three Trade Unions concerned was outlined in a memorandum submitted to the Tribunal at the first public hearing and elaborated in an address by Counsel for the Unions. The claim submitted was a joint one supported by all three Unions representing minesfield workers of all grades. Particular points to be noted were that the suggested revised wage structure involved the merging of Grades VII and VI and the introduction of sub-divisions of the Super Grade.

It was contended that present wages were inadequate on two main grounds. Firstly, that they did not represent a fair reward to the workers in the industry whose efforts were responsible for the high profits which were accruing to the owners and employers. And secondly, that a rise in the cost of living and the need to raise standards in a progressive society made an upward adjustment in wage rates essential. It was argued that the claims were not unreasonable in view of the undoubted prosperity of the industry. Particular reference was made to the current high price of columbite £2,000 per ton. Costs or production were stated to be in the region of £200 per ton. The profit margin on this product was very high indeed and it was claimed by the Unions that the weighted average profit per ton given by operators was £1,348, a figure which allowed for all costs of production and treatment, but not for the amortisation of capital, or for income tax. While the price of metallic tin had fallen from the high prices obtaining in recent years there was still evidence that operators were making good profits. In support of this contention evidence was given of the output of tin of a number of Companies together with details of dividends paid during the past five years. The Unions admitted the economic fact that capital must receive an adequate reward for risk, but suggested that there was scope for an increase in labour's share of the gross product at the expense of profits and taxation.

On the question of the cost of living the Unions said that it was unfortunate that the Government had not so far been able to produce a standard index for Nigeria. Nevertheless there was every indication that there had been an increase and Government had apparently recognised this fact. The Plateau Provincial Wages Board had considered the question of Government rates for labourers and as a result Jos Division was now classified in Group 6 with a minimum of 2s-3d per day for a general labourer effective from 1st December, 1954. The Western Regional Government had raised the minimum daily rate for its employees to 5s with effect from 1st October, 1954 and the Eastern Regional Government had undertaken to consider a minimum of 7s-6d per day. The Federal Government had appointed the Gorsuch Commission to investigate the salary structure of the established staff and had appointed a fact finding committee to examine the cost of living with reference to daily paid employees.

In the absence of official cost of living statistics to which reference could be made the Unions had to rely on their own investigations. They had studied the problem and submitted a suggested average weekly budget for an ordinary labourer as follows:—

On this basis the labourer's wage would need to be not less than 3s-6d per day and explained the minimum for Grade VII in the claim. It was emphasised that this was a moderate presentation of a man's needs. There were a number of other items of recurrent expenditure which had not been included in the budget but which could be regarded as justifiable requirements. Among these were the following, representing expenditure over a fourmonth-period:—

The admission of these items would justify a further addition of 3s per week to the budget, and an addition to the daily wage of 6d per day over and above the claim for 3s-6d a day which was before the Tribunal.

In dealing with the minimum wage the employers would no doubt direct attention to their obligation under section 19 of Order in Council No. 10 of 1948 to make available to their employees 12 lbs of grain at the fixed price of 1s-3d. The Unions suggested that this legislation was regrettable and unfortunate and should be carefully reviewed. It was in consequence of that legislation that the employers had maintained the minimum wage at an artificially low level. They cited paragraph 3 of the agreement of 29th July, 1950 between the Employers' Association and the Nigerian African Mineworkers' Union part of which read as follows:—

"3. In fixing the basic wage at 1s-6d a day it had been taken into consideration that rent is $1\frac{1}{2}d$ and corn subsidy 2d a day."

The effect of that agreement had been that the worker's wages had been compulsorily abated by 2d per day whether or not he took advantage of the supply of grain at the fixed price. The combined result of the legislation and the agreement was that the worker in effect paid 2s-3d for the 12 lbs of grain, the market price of which might fluctuate considerably. On occasion it might be available in the market at a lower price. It was pointed out that there were periods, such as leave, when the worker could not purchase the subsidised grain, but still suffered the abatement of wages. The Unions would prefer the abolition of the fixed price for a fixed quantity of grain so that this factor could be ignored in determining the minimum wage.

The Unions asked that wages should be fixed having regard to all the circumstances of the employment. They drew attention to the fact that the original grading scheme had been drawn up without reference to job evaluation and job study; or to unpleasant and unhealthy working conditions in certain occupations; or to the general insecurity of employment in the industry. On this last point evidence was given to show that there had been retrenchment of labour in 1953 when the world price of metallic tin fell appreciably.

In conclusion the Unions reiterated their contention that the prosperity of the industry should be reflected in the wages of the workers as well as in the dividends paid to shareholders. A formula based upon the findings of the Labour Advisory Board which met in 1946 had been supported by the employers. The continued application of this formula was a device which would keep the labourer at subsistence level, and ignored the need for progress in the social and cultural life of the people. corn subsidy was wrong in principle and it was submitted that while the employers should be obliged to continue to supply corn as required by Order in Council, No. 10 of 1948, there should be no abatement of wages on that account. Finally they asked that if any increase was awarded it should be made retrospective to 1st April, 1954, on the grounds that the claim was originally made known to the employers on 21st January, 1954, and that the employers in offering to increase the minimum wage in the course of negotiations had already acknowledged the fact that the cost of living had been rising steadily.

The first twelve witnesses, each representing a grade, gave evidence of their wages, occupation, skill and experience, length of service, family responsibilities and other obligations, and their ability or inability to save.

Mr Odiah gave information on the operation of a Thrift and Loan Society.

JOSEPH WILSON gave evidence to show the insecurity of minefield employment; he had been discharged and re-engaged no less than five times in eight years, on the last occasion at a lower rate than he had previously earned.

DAVID AGULEFO explained how he had acted for a much senior man in his absence and had not been paid wages commensurate with his responsibility.

Mr OsuJi gave evidence on the question of retrenchment of staff in 1953.

Mrs Olarewanju from her knowledge of market conditions gave evidence on current prices and quantities of various items necessary to feed a family.

THE CASE PRESENTED FOR THE EMPLOYERS

6. The Employers' Association submitted a memorandum at the preliminary meeting of the Tribunal on 9th December, 1954, and this was amplified in a statement by Mr N. L. CARRICK on 11th December, 1954.

The Association justified their rejection of the claims on two main grounds firstly, the trend of wages in the industry had followed that of Government and other employers. Secondly, the present economic position of the industry, apart from the temporary prosperity of the columbite producers, did not justify any appreciable rise in the costs of production.

An outline of wage rate changes in recent years was given and it was pointed out that they had as a background the formula for determining the basic wage recommended by the Minefield Labour Advisory Board in 1946. This formula, arrived at after a thorough investigation of conditions, was as follows:—

- "1. Cost of food adequate to provide a native of the Northern Provinces with 3,300 calories daily for 7 days.
 - 2. Add 10 per cent for fuel.
 - 3. Add 10 per cent for clothing.
 - 4. Add 5 per cent for miscellaneous needs.

To the total reached above add one-third in respect of dependants and the grand total divided by six to be regarded as the minimum daily rate of pay.

The food cost to include 12 lbs of grain at 1s-3d."

In negotiations on wages with the Nigerian African Mineworkers' Union in 1950, a variation of this formula was used by agreement as follows:—

In December 1951, it was agreed with the Nigerian African Mineworkers' Union that there had been an increase in the cost of living and the wages of Grade 7 employees were raised at the minimum by 2d and at the maximum by $\frac{1}{2}d$ per day. No other adjustments were made.

Following further negotiations in 1952 the then existing schedule of wage rates was superseded by the following agreement:—

"(1) The existing schedule of rates of pay is superseded by the following:—

Grade 7 1s-10d by 1d to 2s-1d being an increase of 2d per day.

Grade 6 2s-2d by 1d to 2s-5d being an increase of $2\frac{1}{2}d$ per day.

Grade 5 2s-6d by 2d to 3s being an increase of 3d per day,

Grade 4 3s-3d by 3d to 4s-3d being an increase of 5d per day.

Grade 3 4s-8d by 3d to 5s-8d being an increase of $6\frac{1}{2}d$ per day.

Grade 2 6s-3d by 6d to 8s-3d being an increase of 9d per day.

Grade 19s by 6d to 10s-6d being an increase of 1s per day.

Super 11s-6d and over being an increase of 1s-6d per day.

(2) The wages of watchmen will be 12s-6d per week."

These rates compared with Government rates which were revised at about the same time as follows:—

In making this comparison with Government rates two factors had to be borne in mind: the statutory obligation on the Mining employers to provide free housing and to supply 12 lbs of grain at the fixed price of 1s-3d each week. The value of rent free quarters had generally been assessed at $1\frac{1}{2}d$ per day for wage fixing purposes although similar accommodation in Jos would cost not less than 4d per day at current rates.

The value of the corn subsidy was variable, but it had recently imposed a heavy burden on employers. Taking these two factors into account the wages in the Mining industry compared favourably with the wages paid locally by Government.

The history of the negotiations and conciliation proceedings culminating in the reference of the wages issue to the Arbitration Tribunal was given. In the course of the conciliation proceedings the Association had offered to increase the minimum wage from 1s-10d to 2s per day. This offer was made after a fact finding committee consisting of an independent chairman and one representative each of employers and workers had submitted a report on current market prices. These were used in the following formula:—

In addition to the offer to increase the minimum wage to 2s per day consequential adjustments had been offered for Grades VII, VI and V so as to give an increase of 2d per day to all employees in Grade VII and 1d per day to all those in Grades VI and V. It was considered that no increases were justified in the higher grades in view of the favourable comparison with Government equivalents taking into account the rent free quarters and corn subsidy factors. It was pointed out that even if the individual employee did not use the corn in his diet he could on occasion buy it and resel! it at a profit.

On the question of the ability of employers to pay higher wages it was argued that a rise in wage rates would have a more serious effect on the companies operating largely by hand labour, and so employing a majority of the labour force, than on those which had introduced mechanisation. For example, in 1952-53 the Amalgamated Tin Mines of Nigeria Limited produced 4,710 tons of concentrates with a labour force of approximately 8,000 whereas other companies (whose names were given) produced a total of 1,081 tons with a labour force of approximately 9,900. It was the companies using hand labour which were less prosperous and could ill afford an increase in production costs.

The price of tin at the present time was about £720 per ton, but the employer received only the concentrate value, about 73 per cent of this. Those companies producing tin only were already experiencing financial difficulties. Those paying high dividends which the Unions had cited were the columbite producers, but this apparent prosperity was likely to be temporary in that the 100 per cent bonus for columbite at present being paid by the Government of the United States of America could not be expected to continue indefinitely. The employers emphasised that tin was still the staple industry on the minesfield; they did not wish to see wages based on temporary columbite prosperity. Furthermore it must be borne in mind when speaking of high profits that dividends were declared on the issued capital which often represented only a part of the working capital employed. Figures were quoted in respect of certain companies showing a rate of profit varying from 1 per cent to 5 per cent. The Mining industry was working a wasting asset and must be able to repay capital invested over comparatively short periods while ore reserves lasted.

In conclusion it was pointed out that any increase in wages over and above that justified by a proved increase in the cost of living might compel employers to curtail their operations especially in areas with marginal values and so lead to considerably retrenchment of labour. This might well prove inevitable to a limited degree in any case if output had to be restricted as a result of the International Tin Agreement. The employers had no wish to see widespread unemployment among their workers and were opposed to wage increases, except on compelling evidence of need, for grades other than V, VI and VII.

ADDITIONAL EVIDENCE

- 7. The Tribunal had the opportunity to study the following documents:—
 - (a) Report of the Labour Advisory Board, 1946.
 - (b) Report and proceedings of the Committee appointed in 1952 to enquire into the requirement to supply grain contained in Order in Council No. 10 of 1948.
 - (c) Report of the Board of Inquiry under the chairmanship of Mr Justice Abbott, 1954.
 - (d) Reports and minutes of meetings held during the negotiations leading up to the break-down in conciliation.
 - (e) "Notes for guidance of Employers" issued by the Nigerian Mining Employer's Association, giving information as to grading, wages, overtime, leave, retirement benefits and gratuity, medical attention and discipline.
 - (f) The Balance Sheets and Profit and Loss accounts of various Companies.
- (g) Annual Report of the Mines Department. The Arbitrator discussed the latter with the Chief Inspector of Mines and the Deputy Inspector of Mines.

AWARD OF ARBITRATOR

- 8. Now I, the said JOHN HENRY RICHARDSON, having heard and duly considered all the evidence of the Unions and of the Employers' Association concerning the said dispute do hereby make this my AWARD in writing as to the dispute referred to me as aforesaid:—
 - (1) Grades VI and VII of the Scheme of Rates and Categories in operation at the time of the Arbitration shall be combined into a single grade to be known as Grade VI.
 - (2) The Daily Rates of Wages for the new Grade VI and for Grades I to V and the Super Grade shall be:—

Grade VI 2s-2d by 2d to 2s-8d Grade V 2s-10d by 2d to 3s-4d Grade IV 3s-6d by 3d to 4s-6d 4s-10d by 3d to 5s-10d Grade III Grade II . . 6s-6d by 6d to 8s-6d . . 9s-3d by 6d to 11s-3d Grade I ... Super 12s and over . .

No Award is made on the Senior Service claim,

- (3) In implementing the AWARD, the conversion table attached as an Appendix to this AWARD shall be used.
 - (4) INCREMENTS.
- (a) The conversion table attached as an Appendix is devised to grant credit for increments given in accordance with the scales previously in operation.

- (b) Workpeople who are in employment from a date earlier than, or on the operative date of this AWARD, shall be given increments within their grades at intervals of two years from the operative date of this AWARD.
- (c) Workpeople employed subsequent to the operative date of this AWARD shall be given increments in their grades on 1st November or 1st May after the completion of two years continuous service (e.g., an employee engaged on 1st January, 1955, would be eligible for the first increment on 1st May, 1957—the incremental date next following the second anniversary of his engagement). Thereafter, the increments shall be given at intervals of two years.
- (d) Any future increments to be given under this AWARD may be withheld from any employee upon whose work an adverse report has been made at the date when an increment would be due.
 - (5) OPERATIVE DATE OF AWARD.

The rates of pay and conditions of this AWARD shall be effective from the 1st November, 1954.

CONCLUSION

9. I wish to express my appreciation of the able and helpful manner in which the two sides have presented their respective cases. I express the hope that the present AWARD may contribute towards a greater understanding between the two parties and more stable industrial relations in the industry.

I wish also to record my indebtedness to the Assessors, Mr S. B. Kuku and Mr D. S. McKay, whose advice on technical and other matters has been invaluable. I also wish to express my thanks to the Curator of the Jos Museum, Mr B. E. B. Fagg, for making the Library of the Museum available for the hearings, to Mr A. C. S. Allen, for his able assistance as Secretary to the Tribunal and to Mrs D. Harman and Miss E. L. O'Connell who undertook the detailed work of recording the proceedings.

- 4. The examination is open to bona fide pupils in Standards V and VI in Government and Voluntary Agency Schools approved for First School Leaving Certificate and it is not restricted to boys from the Eastern Region.

- 9. The Boarding and Tuition Fees are £8 per term. There is an Equipment Fee of £1-13s-4d per term. On arrival at the College each boy must deposit the sum of £3 with the Principal. This sum will be used to cover breakages and the loss of, or damage to School property. A separate account will be kept for each boy and any credit balance will be refunded to him at the end of his school career.
- 10. Eleven open scholarships will be awarded at Umuahia, and eight at both Owerri and Afikpo. They will be awarded in order of merit, to boys who attain scholarship standard. In addition a number of Regiona! Scholarships may be awarded to boys from backward areas who pass the Entrance Examination. The scholarships, which cover Boarding and Tuition Fees only, will normally be tenable for the duration of the school career. They will, however, be subject to periodical review and, provided due warning has been given, may be withdrawn at any time on the grounds of bad conduct or bad work.
- 11. Admission will be to Class I only. Candidates who pass the written examination will be called, in order of merit, for an interview with the Principal who reserves the right to reject any candidate on the grounds of age or for any other reason. It is notified for general information that the Western Region Marketing Board, by virtue of its powers under section 16 (a) of the Western Region Marketing Board Law (No. 10 of 1954), has fixed the prices set out in Columns 2, 3 and 4 of the Schedule attached hereto as the minimum prices payable for technical palm oil during 1955 at gazetted buying stations in the Western Region specified in Column 1.
