AND  
IN THE MATTER OF A TRADE DISPUTE BETWEEN THE FEDERAL MEDICAL DEPARTMENT AND  
THE NIGERIAN UNION OF PHARMACISTS

In pursuance of the appointment of the Minister of Labour and Welfare dated 28th February, 1959, I, John Harvey Robson, the Arbitrator, assisted by Afolabi Ijaola Kinoshi and John Aka Egwu the two assessors appointed by the Minister, duly entered upon the arbitration for which I had been appointed and heard the parties to the dispute and received the memoranda and documents submitted to me by them on Wednesday 11th March, Thursday 12th March and Friday 13th March, 1959, and I hereafter set forth my conclusions and award:

1. The terms of reference are not remarkable for their clarity. They require me "to examine the claim of the Nigerian Union of Pharmacists concerning the following matter:— that the entry point into the Federal Public Service for a newly qualified pharmacist in possession of the Chemist and Druggist Diploma of the Nigerian Pharmacy Board should be £594 per annum in Scale C (T) 2". But they do not state what precise questions I am to determine after "examining" the claim, nor do they indicate clearly the criteria or even the kind of criteria which I should apply in deciding whether the point of entry "should be" £594 in Scale C (T) 2.

2. However, after discussion with the representatives of the parties I have interpreted the terms in the following way. I am first to decide whether, having regard to all the circumstances established before me, the Union has satisfied me that the newly-qualified pharmacist solely by virtue of his holding the Diploma of the Nigerian Pharmacy Board is entitled to enter the employment of the Federal Government at £594 in Scale C (T) 2 or secondly, if he is not so entitled, should he enter at that point by virtue of his holding the Diploma coupled with the nature of the work which he is or may be required to do at any time after entering the service, by his position relative to other comparable technological entrants and by reference to conditions of similar employment by commercial and other employers apart from Government. The Union also submitted that the terms of reference permitted and required me, in the event of my finding against the claim to enter the service at the point suggested, to make a finding and award relative to any other adjustments of progress and consequent increases of salary subsequent to entry which I might deem to be appropriate. Mr Biggin for the Department did not concur in this submission but stated that the Department would agree and indeed desire me to put my views concerning this latter aspect of the matter, if I had any, in the form of recommendations.

3. Taking these representations into account, I decide that my award proper should be confined solely to the question whether the claim to enter the service at the point indicated has been made out and that my views on the other matters referred to should be expressed as recommendations only.

4. The contentions of both sides were advanced with assiduity, discretion, moderation and good humour. If this is to be taken as a fair example of the manner in which Unions' claims are to be put forward and met one may feel highly satisfied and the Unions need have no fear at all in carrying to arbitration the disputes which will doubtless arise from time to time during the development of relations between employers and organised employees in Nigeria.

5. The claim made by the Union was clear and unwavering throughout. It was presented under two related but nevertheless distinct heads. Contention (a) was that the holding of the Board's Diploma by a newly-qualified pharmacist entitled him *ipso facto* to enter the service at £594 in C (T) 2. Nothing else was material and nothing else was required. Contention (b) was a wider one. It was said that the newly-qualified pharmacist was entitled to enter the service at £594 in C (T) 2 not only because he held the Diploma but by reason of the actual work which he was or might be required to perform, the responsibilities which he was or might be called upon to undertake, by his position as a technologist *vis à vis* other technologists entering the service and by comparison with the terms of service available at the hands of other employers such as commercial houses, corporations and so on.

6. The use in the terms of reference of the form "The entry point... should be £594 in Scale C (T) 2" and in the argument of the form "The pharmacists are entitled to enter at £594 in Scale C (T) 2" necessarily implies an assertion that they have some right so to enter, that the Government, the employer who determines the terms upon which he is prepared to engage the services of the pharmacists, has given some express or implied promise or undertaking or assurance that this is the point at which pharmacists holding the Diploma shall enter the service or at any rate that by some standards of fairness, equality and good employment this is the point at which they ought to enter and so have the right to enter. And this is how the Union put its case.

7. In support of contention (a) and of the assertion that the Government has given some promise, undertaking or assurance it relied upon the section of what was called the Randell report bearing the title "Officer Pattern" and especially paragraph 56 the material part of which runs "The Officer Pattern also makes provision for direct entry and the grading teams recommendation that entry should be available on (E) 1 and on C (T) 1 for officer with inter-degree or Higher School Certificate qualifications (Education V Appendix 1) is based on the proposition that it is necessary to allow for entry on an appropriate point in the scale half way between the entry point for the School Certificate candidate, £150 in both scales D and E).

and (i) the lowest category of university entrant or (ii) the entrant holding full technological qualification who at present enters on £540 in Scale C (E) 2 and £570 on C (T) 2". The pharmacist, said the Union, is fully technologically qualified and, according to this statement, he enters, or rather should enter, at £570 (now £594) in C (T) 2. If he does not, then a distinction adverse to himself is being maintained between him and other persons technologically qualified—or so it would seem.

8. As regards contention (b) the Union pointed to the Diploma qualification and went on to say that immediately upon or very shortly after entry into the service pharmacists are upon occasion required to act without any immediate supervision, to exercise a considerable measure of discretion and responsibility, in some instances are required to take full charge of dispensaries in remote places and to be ready to advise on matters with which their speciality is concerned and that entry in C (T) 1 involves terms and conditions of employment substantially worse than those available for comparable work in commercial houses. On this footing they say they are fully comparable with persons entering at £594 in C (T) 2 and not below that level.

9. On this aspect of the matter the Union called considerable evidence which I do not think it necessary to record here *in extenso*. I paid most careful attention to it and will refer later to the impression which it made upon me.

10. Against these contentions the Government's case was by no means so clear-cut. It was clouded by what appeared to me to be confusion and ambivalence of thought. This view is certainly not intended to reflect adversely upon Mr Biggin's conduct of the case. Quite the contrary. He applied himself admirably to the task, showed notable loyalty to instructions which can hardly have been easy to follow and with which he was, I suspect, not in full agreement and struggled manfully to disentangle the threads and eventually succeeded. Much of the confusion was, I believe, inherited from what had been said and done in the earlier negotiations and I am not surprised that the Union decided to break off those negotiations and proceed to arbitration.

11. The crux of those negotiations was reached on 16th July, 1958, when, so it is recorded, after the Union had stated its argument concerning the right of those fully technologically qualified to enter the service at £594 in C (T) 2 based on paragraph 56 of the Randell Report—substantially the same argument as that addressed to me—"the official side conceded that the arguments of the Union appeared to be *prima facie* acceptable."

12. Now if the Union's arguments were *prima facie* acceptable, what was the Government's answer that was said to displace the *prima facie* conclusions? It was this: "Paragraph 56 of the Randell Report however laid down general principles only and the Government grading team had assessed the value of the Chemist and Druggist Diploma very carefully before making its recommendation that the pharmacists should be graded in C(T) 1, 2 on qualification." This grading of pharmacists was intended to be a 'probationer' grade for the purpose of selecting those for early advancement to the career grade of Staff Pharmacist in Scale C(T) 2, 3, 4 and 5."

13. If this was the answer to a case which was *prima facie* acceptable it seems to me to be no adequate answer at all, for it does not explain why an exception was being made in the case of the pharmacists to the "general principles" of the Randell Report. There may in fact have been a sufficient and proper reason for making this exception, but if there was, it was not, according to the minutes, then given. The Union not unnaturally said there was no ground for making this exception in the case of the pharmacists if others fully technologically qualified entered at £594 in C(T) 2 as stated in paragraph 56 of the Randell Report, and it would hardly be appraised by the contents of the statement made by the Establishment Secretary on 4th October, 1958.

14. Faced with this difficulty stemming from the admission of its own representatives at the meeting of 16th July, 1958, that the arguments of the Union were *prima facie* acceptable the Government was led into putting forward the contention that after obtaining the Board's Diploma the pharmacists were not really fully technologically qualified and for this reason were excluded from the application of paragraph 56 of the Randell Report. This argument was long pressed upon me and Mr Randell was actually called before me to support it. He was for saying as I understood him—and it was certainly the point which the Government urged—that a difference exists between "technologically qualified" and "fully technologically qualified"; that the latter expression as used in paragraph 56 referred to persons holding an appropriate diploma or certificate who had also had a period of years of practical experience.

15. Whether, especially having regard to the word "holding" in paragraph 56, I would have accepted this interpretation had the expression appeared in paragraph 56 alone I do not know. But obviously I cannot do so when I find it used in quite the contrary sense in neighbouring paragraphs of the same section of the report and comparable expressions appearing in associated paragraphs and pointing to a different meaning. I refer for instance to paragraph 54 (2) and in doing so wish to make clear that I am not in any way dealing with the substance of that paragraph but pointing to it simply because of the light it throws on the meaning of the expression in question. There appears the passage "This course might also apply where an officer has undergone a highly specialised course of technological training and has failed to obtain the final qualification. Such an officer has a detailed knowledge and ability far higher than that of a technician or clerk but without the full technological qualification he cannot (i.e., is precluded) carry out the duties of the post." In this context it is manifest that "final qualification" coming as it is said to do at the end of a period of specialised training, must mean the diploma or certificate and to my mind it is equally clear that "full technological qualification" is used as an alternative to "final qualification".



and is given precisely the same meaning; not as meaning a diploma plus so many years' practical experience. I have already mentioned that paragraph 56 itself speaks of the entrant "holding a full technological qualification." Holding a qualification is a common expression meaning possessing a diploma; certificate or the like; it does not, I think, without doing violence to the ordinary use of expressions refer to the qualifications of a person having both a diploma or certificate and also a number of years' practical experience. For this purpose one would normally say "He has (not holds) the qualifications of an experienced pharmacist, engineer, electrician, . . ." To my mind the employment of the word "holding" and the singular "qualification" in paragraph 56 is decisive. Again, in paragraph 58 the expression "full technological qualification" is indubitably used in connection with the acquisition of a diploma or certificate and nothing more.

16. Unless therefore I were persuaded that the expression "fully technologically qualified" had been given a separate and distinct meaning in paragraph 56—and I am not so persuaded—I could not hold that the expression possesses the meaning for which the Government contends. In my judgment a pharmacist who acquires the Diploma of the Nigerian Pharmacy Board, which is a statutory diploma entitling him to practice pharmacy freely is "fully technologically qualified."

17. The Government laboured this point so hard that I began to wonder whether for some reason which I could not fathom it felt constrained to admit that once the pharmacists were accounted fully technologically qualified they had for this reason alone some right to enter the service at £594, or in other words they had established their case. After all, I could not forget the minute stating that "the arguments of the Union appeared to be *prima facie* acceptable" although why they were so acceptable I do not know. Therefore in order to bring the matter to a clear issue if I could, I ventured to address a written question to Mr Biggin: "If the tribunal were to hold that a pharmacist holding the Yaba diploma (i.e., the diploma of the Pharmacy Board) is fully technologically qualified would the Government consider he would be entitled to enter (employment) at C(T) 2?" Mr Biggin obtained instructions and his reply was of course upon those instructions. Instead of the answer being a plain unequivocal "No", which was the answer I expected, which was the answer which would markedly have clarified and advanced the Government's case and which was the answer which in the end took shape, as I shall indicate, it was a long reply which was really no answer at all to the question but a mere reiteration of the assertion that the pharmacists were not fully technologically qualified. And so my problem remained. I thought I perceived what the Government's real case was but I could scarcely make it if the Government would not adopt or develop it. Poor Mr Biggin became deeper sunk in an argument in which, quite evidently, he had little heart.

18. But at long last the Government's true case emerged, however diffidently and by chance. It was not that the pharmacists were not fully technologically qualified but that the grading had been adopted on the basis that the Government was not prepared to employ a newly-qualified pharmacist at £594 in C(T) 2 until he not only held the Board's Diploma but had also had a number of years' practical experience and that this is the same standard as that which is applied to other persons having full technological qualifications and is a standard which the Government is entitled to set up and maintain having given any promise or undertaking to the contrary.

19. I am of course conscious that the principle of grading mentioned in the preceding paragraph which I find was adopted and applied cannot be reconciled with the statement in paragraph 56 of the Randall Report upon which the Union naturally laid so much stress nor with the strange admission made on 16th July, 1958, that the arguments of the pharmacists were *prima facie* acceptable and it is this irreconcilability which has caused me the greatest concern in this arbitration. But I have come to the conclusion that in accepting the actual gradings proposed the Government did not bind itself by all the statements and comments made in the Report and it has given no assurance to the pharmacists or to other persons fully technologically qualified that their point of entry into the service would be £594 in C(T) 2. On the contrary it has made known that the point of entry which it was prepared to grant such people who, though possessing full technological qualifications, had no or no substantial practical experience, was in C(T) 1.

20. My own impression is, for what it is worth, that the expression "fully technologically qualified" has, in view of the meaning clearly attached to it in neighbouring paragraphs as I have shown, been inappropriately used in paragraph 56 and the admission in the negotiations that the pharmacists' arguments were *prima facie* acceptable is only comprehensible on the footing that those who made it did not fully understand their case and were nonplussed by the appearance of the expression in its context in paragraph 56.

21. Once this Government case took proper shape the Union's contention (a) became far less strong and indeed untenable unless they could show that the Government was not applying its own principle impartially but was differentiating against them. If I were satisfied by adequate evidence that the Government had really adopted and acted upon the controversial sentence in paragraph 56 so far as fully technologically qualified persons generally were concerned and had made an exception in the case of the pharmacists I should unhesitatingly find in the Union's favour. But I am not so satisfied. Suggestions were made and some evidence given in support of differentiation but when they were closely examined they did not convince me, and in the result I hold that the Union's contention (a) fails. Nevertheless I do consider that the attitude adopted by the Union is quite understandable; it has been largely contributed to by a sentence in paragraph 56 of the Randall Report which I can only describe as unfortunate and by the strange admission of the negotiators on 16th July, 1958.



22. I turn to contention (b). While I am quite prepared to believe and do believe that from time to time considerable responsibility of one kind and another has been placed upon relatively newly qualified pharmacists, I do not think this goes beyond what one might expect having regard to the requirements of the service or beyond what is demanded of other fully qualified technologists also graded in C(T) 1. Nor am I convinced in the light of all the evidence given to me about pharmaceutical service with employers other than Government in Nigeria or with employers, Government or otherwise, in other countries such as Ghana and Great Britain that Government has treated newly-qualified pharmacists unfairly or not as a good employer should. One can of course point to differences in terms of employment and conditions of work but when the terms of employment and conditions of work of newly-qualified pharmacists in Government service in Nigeria (and by Government service I mean Federal Government Service) are looked at as a whole in comparison with the terms and conditions with those other employers it does not appear that those of the Federal Government service are materially worse on the balance. I therefore conclude that the Union's contention (b) has not been made out.

23. On the other hand I am strongly of opinion that the time which, under the present arrangements, must elapse before a newly-qualified pharmacist entering the Federal Government service can pass to the C(T) 2 part of his C(T) 1, 2 grading is far too long. The very foundation of his being originally placed in C(T) 1 although he holds his Diploma is said to be that he has not the required practical experience to go with his full technological qualification. It follows from this reasoning, which I have found to be proper and to have been applied by the Government, that as soon as he had acquired this practical experience he should proceed to the C(T) 2 part and I have come to the very definite conclusion that normally—and for a purpose of this kind one must apply the standard of the norm—he will have acquired the needed practical experience within three years of his first employment. At first I was inclined to two years but on reflection I consider three years would be better—but three years at the most. I say “the needed practical experience” because practical experience is never complete. There is no final limit. One continues to acquire it during the whole of one's working life.

24. I am conscious of the fact that this, or something very like it, was the period suggested by way of compromise by the Government representatives during the course of negotiations. But I have ignored this fact and have arrived at what happens to be the same conclusion by independent reasoning of my own. Having done so, I am fortified by finding that it is concurred in by the assessors with their intimate knowledge of the work involved, perhaps a little reluctantly by the assessor nominated by the Union.

25. Accordingly (i) I hold that the Nigerian Union of Pharmacists has failed to satisfy me that the entry point into the Federal Public Service for a newly-qualified pharmacist in possession of the Chemist and Druggist Diploma of the Nigerian Pharmacy Board should be £594 per annum in Scale C(T) 2 and therefore make my award in favour of the Federal Medical Department.

(ii) I strongly recommend that a newly-qualified pharmacist holding the Chemist and Druggist Diploma of the Nigerian Pharmacy Board entering the Federal Public Service as at present in C(T) 1, 2 should advance to the C(T) 2 part of his grading at the conclusion of, at most, three years from his original entry.
