

**THE STATE SECURITY (DETENTION OF PERSONS) (NO. 2)
DECREE 1967**



Decree No. 22

[16th March 1967]

Commence-
ment.

WHEREAS the Head of the Federal Military Government is satisfied that the arrest and detention of the person mentioned in the Schedule to this Decree is in the interest of the security of Nigeria and it is expedient to make this decree accordingly :

NOW THEREFORE the Federal Military Government hereby decrees that—

1. The person named in the Schedule to this Decree shall be detained for a period not exceeding six months from the date of its commencement in such place or places as the Head of the Federal Military Government may from time to time direct either generally or specially, and the person so detained shall be liable to be removed to and be detained there under conditions as to confinement, including the like conditions as to maintenance, discipline and punishment for breaches of discipline as may, from time to time, be imposed in respect of persons duly convicted of an offence by a court of law.

Power to detain person named in the Schedule.

2. The provisions of sections 2 to 6 of the State Security (Detention of Persons) Decree 1966 (which *inter alia* provide for representations by persons detained to tribunals specially constituted and for the suspension of certain provisions of the Constitution of the Federation) shall apply to this Decree as they apply to the aforesaid Decree of 1966, and they shall be construed accordingly.

Application of certain provisions of the State Security (Detention of Persons) Decree 1966 No. 3.

3.—(1) This Decree may be cited as the State Security (Detention of Persons) (No. 2) Decree 1967 and shall be deemed to have come into operation on 16th March 1967.

Citation, commencement and application.

(2) This Decree shall have effect throughout Nigeria.

WHEREAS the Head of the Federal Military Government is satisfied that the arrest and detention of the person mentioned in the Schedule to this Decree is in the interest of the security of Nigeria and it is expedient to make this decree accordingly :

NOW THEREFORE the Federal Military Government hereby decrees that—

1.
