CATEGORIES

1. The Order may be awarded to South African Citizens in the following categories :

- (i) Order of Luthuli (Gold)

To South African citizens whose exceptional contribution in the following fields has served the interests of the Republic of South Africa:

- the struggle for democracy
- building democracy and human rights
- nation building
- justice and peace
- resolution of conflict

(ii) Order of Luthuli (Silver)

To South African Citizens whose excellent contribution in the abovementioned fields has served the interests of the Republic of South Africa.

(iii) Order of Luthuli (Bronze)

To South African citizens whose outstanding contribution in the abovementioned fields has served the interests of the Republic of South Africa.

INSIGNIA

2. The Insignia of the Order of Luthuli shall consist of-

- (i) the Neck Decoration;
- (ii) the Miniature and
- (iii) the Lapel Badge

2.1 Neck Decoration and Miniature

- (i) Both the neck Decoration, Miniature and Lapel Badge shall be identical in design, differing only in metallic content, size and means of suspension.
- (ii) A triangle representing an ancient flintstone, bearing in the upper part a rising sun and below the sun Isandlwana mountain; The lower part bears a stylised representation of the national flag draped, with the partitioned lines curved.

The flag is bordered on the sides by 13 roundels, beneath the flintstone is a representation of an ornamented clay pot bearing the initials AL in black enamel. The flintstone is flanked by a pair of cow's horns, issuant from headrings bearing a leopard-skin pattern resting on the clay pot.

- (iii) The principal metal of Category I shall be Gold; of Category II Silver; and of Category III Bronze. In the case of category I the representation of the horns shall be in white gold and for category II and III, they shall be in silver;
- (iv) The overall dimensions of the neck decoration shall be 70 mm in length 56,7 mm in width and 6mm thick.
- (v) The dimensions of the miniature shall be one third the size of the Neck Decoration.
- (vi) Both the full size and miniature insignia shall bear on the reverse the national coat of arms in relief.
- (vii) The reverse of the Neck Decoration shall bear, beneath the coat of Arms of the Republic of South Africa, a serial number.

2.2 Ribbon

- (i) The ribbon shall be 36 mm in width, gold in colour and have within borders bearing a circular bead-like pattern, 3mm wide and set 2mm from the outer edges, recurring stylised representations of the national flag as appearing on the flintstone, 20 mm in width, and set 45mm apart, all of a cream colour.
- (ii) The miniature ribbon shall be half the width of the full-size ribbon.

2.3 Lapel Badge

The lapel badge shall be similar in size and design to the miniature, but without the coat of arms on the reverse.

OFFICIALS OF THE ORDER

The lapel badges of the respective categories shall be worn on the left lapel of the jacket and in the case of females, as a brooch.

GENERAL RULES

- 6. The conferment of the Order shall not entitle recipients to any individual precedence, rank, style or title, but they shall be entitled to indicate that they have been invested with the relevant category of the Order by the use of the following post-nominal letters:

CATEGORIES

1. The Decoration may be awarded to South African citizens in the following categories :

- (i) Mendi Decoration for Bravery (Gold)

To South African citizens who have performed an act of conspicuous bravery through which their lives were placed in great danger or who have lost their lives, including trying to save the life of another person, or by saving property, in or outside the Republic of South Africa.

(ii) Mendi Decoration for Bravery (Silver)
